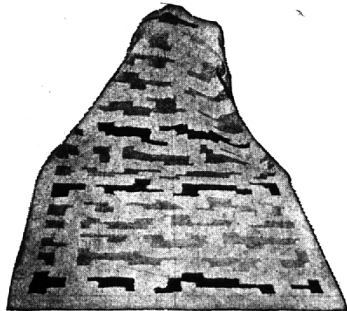

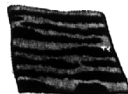
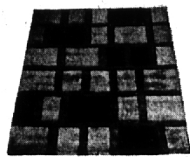

New Street Light At Shipman, Lincoln

A new street light will be installed at the intersection of Shipman and Lincoln.

Birmingham city commissioners authorized the administration to enter into an agreement with Detroit Edison for the installation of the light Monday night.

A postal card survey of residents on the Shipman-Lincoln corner showed two were in favor of the light and two were opposed.

Assistant City Manager Robert S. Kenning said the master plan called for a light at that intersection and "was the only corner east of Southfield on Lincoln where there was no light."

now have 28," he said as he rushed off to another representative.

"If the tax reform dies in committee, it will be said the Republicans did it," Hogan said.

When the income tax and amendment finally reached the floor Thursday, representatives turned it down by a vote of 47 to 46.

Michigan will not have a fiscal report this year.

Some legislators went deer hunting, lobbyists went back to their businesses and the Capitol staff returned to routine duties.

ACTIVITY at the Capitol will resume Dec. 31, when the legislators return to begin implementation of the new State Constitution.

Hogan said one area of concern will be elections.

Under the new constitution, there will be no spring elections. Because several positions are filled at that time, it must be decided who gets elected and when.

The legislature can only lengthen the terms of officials, Hogan said, so some will remain in office longer than they originally anticipated.

THE NEW Michigan Constitution provides for a court of appeals. It will be the intermediate court between the county circuit court and the State Supreme Court.

Sen. Farrell E. Roberts (R-Oakland), said Michigan is one of the few industrial states without a court of appeals.

Roberts is chairman of the Judiciary Committee which is considering the court. It will handle appeals from circuit court and lighten the load of the Supreme Court.

HOGAN SAID apportionment of the state is up in the air. Because of the new constitution coming into effect this year, the state was not apportioned last year.

The bipartisan Apportionment Commission of four members of each party must come up with a plan by June so primaries can be planned for August. The legislative filing date is in June.

Hogan, chairman of the Apportionment Committee, said if the state is not apportioned in time, there will be no November elections, unless a special election is held.

If not, Hogan said, the present legislators will stay on for two extra years, because the next election would be in November, 1966.

IF APPORTIONMENT goes as planned, Bloomfield Township and Troy will comprise one district. This will be the strongest Republican district in Michigan, Hogan predicted.

Under the new constitution, if a county comprises one per cent of Michigan's population, it receives a representative.

Allocations of property tax is another area of implementation for the legislators when they return to the Capitol Dec. 1.

Currently there is a property tax of 16 mills, which is allocated by the County Allocation Board. Oakland County gives approximately 6.5 to the county, 1.3 to townships and more than 8 to schools.

Allocations fluctuate according to the board's mood, Hogan said. They meet annually to decide where the mills will go.

THE NEW constitution states that counties may tax 18 mills. The voters instead of the board will decide where the funds go. When it must be decided where funds will be spent, three or four per cent of the voters will petition for setting the allocations and state how they will be broken up, Hogan said. There will then be a vote the following year.

Hogan said there will be no problem getting the petitions for allocation circulated, because school boards will be anxious to take care of this to insure their share of the 18 mill tax.
