The group will perform at churches, operas, and ensembles throughout South America.

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Oakland to Award Four Scholarships

Five \$4,000 scholarships (for four years) will be awarded to high school graduates of June, 1964, at Oakland University, according to Glen Brown, director of scholarships for the university.

Competitive examinations for all interested high school seniors will be given at 10 a.m. Saturday, in the Oakland Center, Oakland University, Rochester.

The winners will be determined on the basis of examination standing, and all stipends, up to \$1,000 per year, will be based on financial need of the participants. It is not necessary for a student to have been admitted to the university in order to participate in the examination.

REGISTRATION FORMS for the scholarship testing can be obtained through local high school counselors, or by contacting the director of scholarships, Oakland University. Registration forms should be returned to the university by Saturday.

These premium scholarships are a part of a comprehensive scholarship award program sponsored by Oakland University. During the present academic year more than 200 students are attending the university with the help of scholarship aid.

Nine Birmingham students and one Bloomfield Hills student are studying under Oakland University Scholarships this current year.

A volunteer group of Oakland and Mecom county citizens is successfully raising funds annually to sustain the scholarship program.

At the next meeting at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 4, three lawyers will report on the legal aspects of establishing a two-year college in the county.

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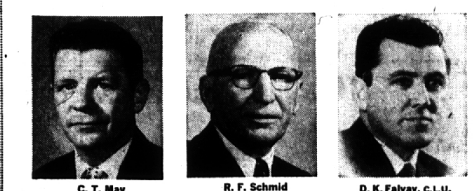
