## 'Y' Secretary, Students See UN at Work

Under the sponsorship of the Hi-Y program of the YMCA, Mr. Chet McLemore, program secretary of the Birmingham Y, and students James McQuaid, John Piraino, and Pete Hamlin, along with 51 other high school boys from the Detroit area made a trip to the United Nations Headquarters in New York.

Leaving by train on Sunday, Nov. 10, the group was at the United Nations Building early Monday morning for a tour. In the afternoon the technical assistance program to underdeveloped countries was explained to them.

On Tuesday morning they visited the Russian Mission to the UN where a delegate from the USSR spoke, and later the same morning the Mexican Mission was seen.

ON THAT afternoon, the boys were taken to the Italian and United States missions, and in each case delegates spoke on the relationship of their country to the United Nations. Later the same day the group sat in an specialized committee meetings and heard discussions on colonialism in Portugal and South Africa.

The Field Commander of the UN Armed Forces spoke to them on Wednesday morning, more committee meetings were attended, then the group heard the head of the Department of UN Agriculture talk about the redeveloping of agriculture. On Wednesday afternoon, they heard a speaker from UNESCO and attended the General Assembly, before returning by train that evening.

James McQuaid, a senior at Cranbrook, summed the trip up by saying:

"We gained a more thorough understanding of the workings of the United Nations, and consequently, more insight into its value."
