**Barons Set to Open Area Cage Season**

There's little rest for the sports fan between seasons this year. With football just leaving the high school scene, basketball is bouncing into the picture.  
 Bloomfield Hills will open the season against Oak Park Tuesday in an away game that will mark Baron coach Hal Henderson's debut.  
 Henderson, one-time cage mentor at Harper Woods Notre Dame, stepped in to fill the void left by Ed Wichert, when the latter accepted a newly-created recreation post in Bloomfield Hills last summer.

HENDERSON will be out to start things on the right foot. Last year the Barons tied for the Wayne-Oakland title, posting an 11-3 record in league play.  
 Bloomfield will face Northville in their first league encounter the following Friday in a game at the Barons' home court.  
 The Eastern Michigan League starts off with a bang Nov. 29, the day after Thanksgiving, when the cage champ Ferndale comes to Seaholm.

 performed in fine fashion, opening holes up the middle for Maple power plays. He swims and plays tennis at Seaholm; is looking forward to college.  
 Guard Sandy Eynon of Bloomfield is the smallest player, but makes up for it in ability and determination. At five-foot, seven-inches and 155, Eynon was the mainstay of the Baron line. He runs track, likes to hunt.  
 Groves tackle Pete Johnson stands six-foot, one and one-half and weighs 210. In his third year of football, Pete proved a hard man to move and opened up many holes for Falcon backs. He likes golf and boating.

SEAHOLM'S FINE end, Ron Jacobson, rounds out the line. A six-foot, three-inch, 205-pound senior, Jacobson was a key player on offense and defense. He turned in a fine game against Kimball and his key interceptions helped break up several Maple games this year. Also plays basketball.  
 The backfield is directed by West Bloomfield's fine quarterback, Dan Greig. An All-County selection last year, he once again had a fine season for the Lakers. An accurate passer and quick runner, Greig sparked the Laker offense. He is a senior, five-foot 10 and one-half inches tall. He also plays basketball and baseball.  
 The halfbacks are probably two of the fastest in the county. Al Proctor of Groves is a five-foot 10 and one-half inch senior with tremendous breakaway speed. He was deadly as a runner and pass receiver for the Falcons. He is a swimmer and a track man for Groves.  
 Ken Heft is the only First Team repeater from last year's squad. A tremendous broken-field runner with amazing power for a five-foot, eight and one-half inch back, Heft was the key figure for the Maples. A baseball and track star, he is also the state Class A diving champ.

BRANT CONLEY, the team's powerhouse fullback, is the biggest man on the squad. Tipping the scales at 225, a fine bread-and-butter runner, Conley came into his own in the Ferndale game, grinding out 120 yards and two TD's. A six-foot two and one-half inch senior, Conley also plays basketball and baseball. He has been offered four football scholarships to college. He also is a fine punter.

KINNISSON HAS been at Groves three years. He coached one year in Arcadia, O., and two years at Madison Heights. He and his wife, Nancy, have two children, Lori, 3, and Greg, one and one-half.  
 Kinmisson graduated from Manchester College, Ind. The family resides in Birmingham.

**HUNTERS NUMBER 400,000**

**Early Deer Kill Indicates Chance of Record Harvest**

 With the first weekend of the state's deer hunting season now past, early reports of hunter kills indicate that the Conservation Department could be correct in predicting a record harvest of deer this year.  
 Experts had estimated that Michigan hunters would bag a total of 120,000 whitetails before the firearms season comes to a close on Nov. 30.  
 Nearly half of this total is expected to be antlerless deer taken by holders of "any deer" permits in 46 over-populated deer areas.  
 The deer-hunting army reached its peak over the weekend as tens of thousands of hunters ranged through the northern woods. Hunters tied up traffic on northern highways for miles as they crept along, bumper to bumper.  
 SATURDAY's hunters had blue skies and sunshine. Many hunters reported seeing plenty of deer. Favorable weather would enhance the chances for a record kill. Several hunters were reported to have shot. The Conservation Department is pleading with hunters to carefully check before shooting when they see a set of antlers. Michigan's elk herd has grown considerably in recent years. From a total of eight animals released in the Pigeon River area during the 1918-19 period, the herd is now estimated to range between 2,000 and 3,500 animals.  
 THERE IS no open season as yet on Michigan's elk. The Conservation Department has undertaken a long-range research program to refine the estimated number and cross-check problems of over-breeding.  
 Some small-scale, carefully controlled hunting program will be needed soon to prevent elk from ranging too far and eliminate competition for food with deer. But, until then, hunters are urged to check their sights before pulling the trigger.
