177 DELEGATES TAKE PART

Marian's 2nd Annual Model UN Debates World Problems

Marian's second annual model United Nations was judged by all observers to be both efficient and comprehensive. Though all 177 delegates and secretariat members were outstanding, special awards were given certain delegates.

Winning the top award the plaque for the best delegation, was the nation of the United States of America. Delegates were Kathleen Darga, chairman; Mary Slowik and Suzanne Young.

Other students winning honorable mention were Doris Flaherty, John AcAlon of Brother Rice, Teresa Peterson, Cynthia Deihl, Sarah Smith, Ann Nemetz, Colleen Taylor, Ann Heisler and Judith McKinnon.

DELEGATES OF 59 countries participated in debate on four questions: the Representation of Red China, Race Relations in South Africa, the Repatriation of Palestine Refugees and an improper white paper pertaining to Malaysia.

Meriting special recognition were Linda Gibson, president of the assembly; Jean Scholls, secretary-general; Frances Thayer, Kathleen Sullivan and Carol Bolz, committee chairmen. Christine Miller acted as parliamentarian to the General Assembly.

Several guest speakers addressed the assembled delegates. Miss Maryvonne Letch, an exchange student from Viet Nam currently studying at Marygrove College, spoke on the situation in her country, and on its relation to the United Nations.

Miss Marian Edmon, of the Wayne State University department of Education, spoke on the question of the admission of Red China, justifying this action on the basis of history and foreign policy.

MISS ANLA Malus, a student from India, and Mr. Raul Pinillos, affiliated with the Peruvian division of General Motors spoke on their respective countries. Miss Malu from the humanitarian and political standpoint, Mr. Pinillos on the geographical status of Peru.

Sister Mary Aquinas, a former member of the Marian faculty currently working at Immaculata High School in Detroit, spoke of her views of the United Nations from the standpoint as co-founder of the Marian organization. The assembly was dedicated to the late Sister M. Benigna, who had arranged the schedules and appointments for the assembly.

Faculty members carrying on the work of these two co-founders include Sister M. Veronita, Sister Jerome Marie, Sister Kenneth Marie, Miss Rosemary Hordos, Mrs. Wm. Schumacher and Mr. Murphy of Brother Rice High School.

THE CLOSING of Founders' Week was the occasion for a musical recital by two Sisters of the L.H.M. order, the order which staffs Marian High School. Colleges represented will include the Universities of Dayton, Detroit and Michigan as well as Wayne State and Michigan State. Colleges will include Madonna,

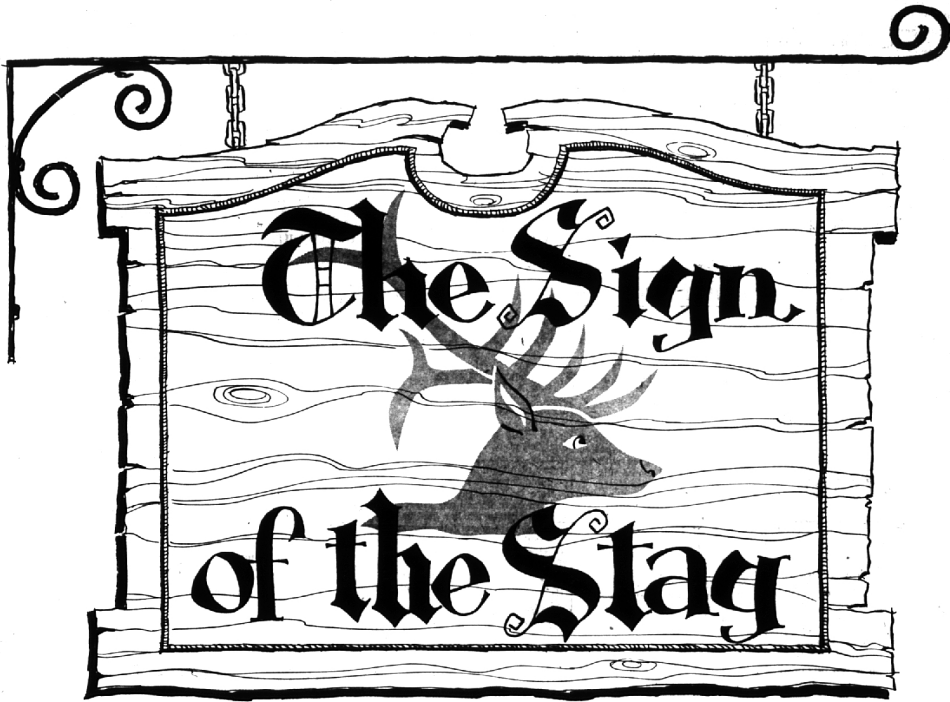
Mercy, Marygrove, St. Mary's Notre Dame and many others.

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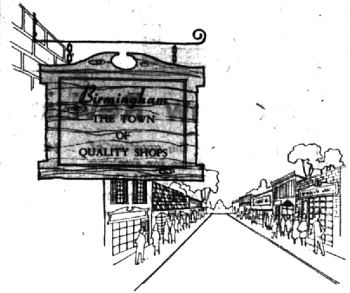
