Three Birmingham school officials were among 250 attending the Special Community School Workshop held in Flint recently in conjunction with the Cooperative Inter-University Seminar. Attending from this area were William S. Corliss, director of elementary education, Birmingham schools; John W. Dickey, principal, Berkshire Junior High School; Dr. W. Ray Smittle, professor of Wayne State University of 30565 Vernon Drive, Birmingham. The group included school superintendents, board of education members, principals, teachers, city officials, representatives of school organizations, and interested citizens. They heard first-hand reports of the value of the community school concept in education.

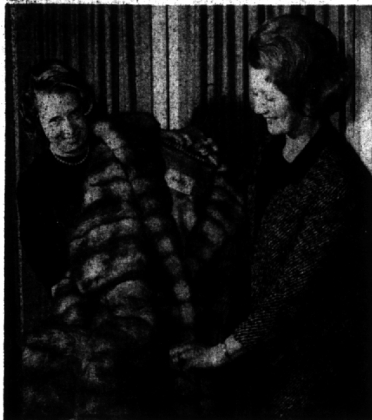

**6-County Confab  
to Define Area  
Development Goals**

Oakland County residents will be among a six-county group participating in a second conference on metropolitan goals to be held Tuesday, Dec. 3 in the Veterans Memorial Building, Detroit. "Our Metropolitan community: Defining our Goals" will have as its keynote speaker Dr. James A. Norton, President of the Greater Cleveland Associated Foundation. Wide emphasis, however, will be placed on public discussion of physical, economic, social/cultural and governmental goals for the Detroit region of Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, St. Clair, Washtenaw, and Wayne counties.

Executive Council members expected at the conference include former Birmingham Mayor Mrs. Florence Willett; George Catlin, of Franklin, Director of Area Development, Detroit Edison Company; Gerald E. Crane, architect and planner, Bloomfield Township; and Paul R. Brown, architect and Forum President, of Bloomfield Township.

Other Oakland County Forum members are Raymond J. Alexander, Director of Public Works and Mayor of Oak Park; James A. Aliber, Birmingham, vice president and treasurer, First Federal Savings of Detroit; David Calhoun, Mayor of Huntington Woods; Dr. Robert M. Frisbe, Ferndale, executive director, Detroit Round Table of Catholics, Jews and Protestants; David Geer, planning consultant, Bloomfield Hills, Delos Hamlin, chairman, Oakland County Board of Supervisors; John H. Hunt, Birmingham, retired General Motors executive; William H. McGaughey, Bloomfield Hills, vice president of American Motors Corp. and president, Oakland Citizens League; Robert H. Snyder, Birmingham architect; and Howard Zuidema, Royal Oak, staff supervisor, Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

SPONSORED BY the area-wide Forum for Detroit Area Metropolitan Goals, the conference is a sequel to a metropolitan goals conference held last May which attracted over a thousand participants. Brown, president of the Forum, said that the program for this second meeting is designed to provide an opportunity for those attending to take an active part in group discussion. A draft of the four community goals: physical, economic, social,

cultural, and governmental, have been drafted and will be presented to the conference for discussion and further definition. In a brief closing session, the four discussion groups will convene to chart a continuing program leading to a definition of metropolitan goals, which will be supported by the community. Oakland County residents wishing to attend the conference can make reservations by calling the office of the Forum secretary, WO. 3-1443. Principal objective of the conference, according to Brown, is to stimulate the joint interest of citizens and public officials in long-range goals to guide the development of the areas.
