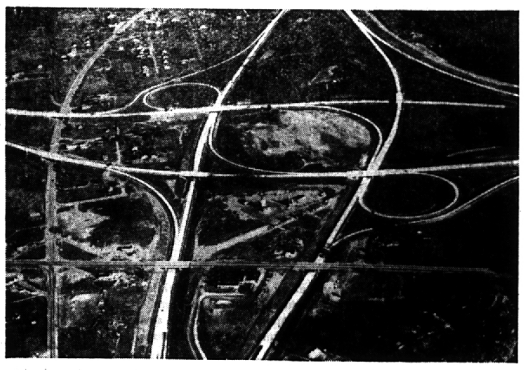

**South American Teen To Visit for Two Months**

Sixteen-year-old Beatriz is among a group of 25 students on vacation from classes in South America who will be living with American families while they study and do charity work. The program, sponsored through the Christian Family Movement, is the first of its kind.
