Professor Favors Area College Work

The community college has tremendous potential for the development of technical education, according to Ralph C. Wenrich, University of Michigan professor of vocational education and practical arts.

The university educator lists five advantages in operating technical education programs as a part of the comprehensive community college.

"Many states have community colleges already well established; Where established, they are recognized as institutions of high education offering work which is 'college level'; Community colleges are more readily available and less expensive, since students may live at home;

COMMUNITY COLLEGES offer a variety of services which are available to students pursuing a technical education program; these include general education courses, cultural and social activities and athletic and other recreational activities; and Community colleges make it possible for students with diversified interests and aspirations to be associated in activities of common interest."

Says Wenrich, "Since we can cite many examples of community colleges with excellent technical programs, we must conclude that it is possible to develop quality programs in a community college."

"Most of the community colleges in Michigan offer some technical education programs. One of them offers as many as 17 different programs designed to train technical workers."

Hudson's also has a new gallery of expensive, top-notch stuff. I'll bet you never thought of looking at the Cranbrook Institute of Science desk for gifts. Found here are originals and reproductions of those compelling Baffin Island Eskimo sculptures and beautiful books published by the Cranbrook Institute of Art, at Cranbrook's sculptures and "Wild Flowers of Michigan."

The Detroit Institute of Arts' publication desk trove reveals prints of old and new masters, fabulous art books, reproductions of small sculpture and ancient jewelry, and note cards and paper featuring art works.

Out for the first time is a marvelous new calendar that starts with September, includes every public function of the museum, reproduction of art works and numerous details about events, plus date squares big enough to write in.

Pamela Stump Walsh has a show at the Raven Gallery. Her sculptures are visually light and charming in welded metal. They look like three-dimensional line drawings. You may be distracted by all that fun hoopla going on: served lunches, meeting friends and lively entertainment of a refreshing bent.

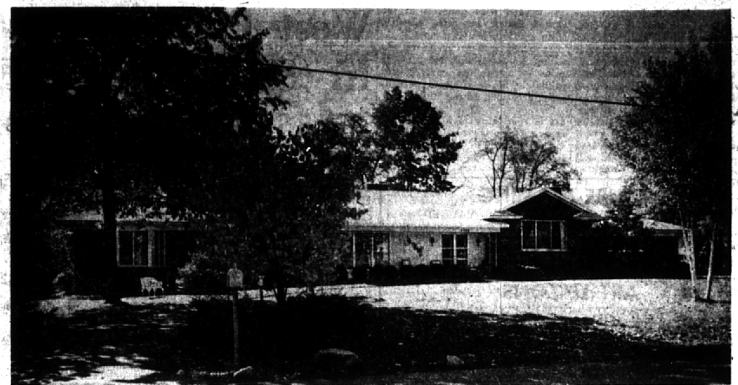
