A newly-established Public Relations committee, consisting of members of both student councils will arrange publicity for school functions and will plan future joint activities.

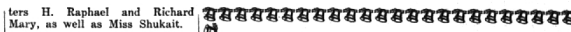

Faculty advisors included Sister H. Raphael and Richard Mary, as well as Miss Shukat.



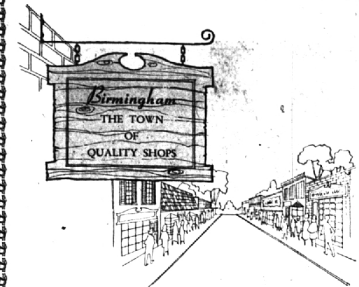
Ann Marie Murphy was especially impressed by the fact that "so many nationally-known speakers, and so many students from all over the country attended, all of us sharing common interests and common goals."

THIS GROUP, part of the Michigan Council of Churches Youth for Understanding program, will make concert appearances for six to eight weeks in Argentina and Brazil.

The 70 students from 40 high schools, including 23 singers from Oakland County were selected on the basis of their value as exchange students as well as their voices. Each Saturday there are rehearsals in Ann Arbor.

Grant U-M \$390,000

The Regents of The University of Michigan accepted gifts, grants and bequests of more than \$390,000 at a recent meeting.

The largest grant was \$100,000 from the Ford Foundation "for support to increase attendance by engineering faculty from other institutions at the University's summer engineering conferences."

The smallest of the country's national monuments is Castle Clinton in New York City. It consists of exactly one acre.
