

## West Bloomfield Sells \$1,600,000 In School Bonds

The West Bloomfield Township Board of Education has sold bonds totaling \$1.6 million to a Detroit firm, Hagan Bosworth and Co., with an average interest rate of 3.7 per cent; was the lowest of three bids.

SCHOOL authorities said \$800,000 of the money will be used for construction of a junior high school, while another \$400,000 will go for the purchase of school sites. The bond issue, accepted by voters in June, will run for 30 years. The board estimates it will spend \$150,000 on additions to present facilities and \$125,000 to pay off a 1952 bond issue.

THE TRADITIONAL AFS-YFU assembly is for the purpose of introducing the exchange students to the student body. Gabriele Glasning, Tommi Kilberg and Birgitte Hanson will be introduced by Pat Squibb, student chairman of the YFU committee. Each will give a brief speech.

Also speaking will be Tori Peterson, Tori is living with Sue Thacker while in the United States.

Under the direction of Mr. Baggs, dramatics advisor, and Mr. Seelack, vocal instructor, the Christmas assembly will include a performance by the SHS choir and a Christmas reading. Christmas baskets will be presented to the Salvation Army at this time.

AT THE LAST meeting of Seaholm's Student Congress, a resolution to promote the building of an auditorium was passed. The main points of the proposal stated that: (1) There is a need for an auditorium (2) Student Congress shall establish a special fund with an initial appropriation of \$150, and thereafter, an annual appropriation of not less than 40 per cent of the balance on hand at the end of the school year towards the building of an auditorium. (3) Student Congress shall operate with the consent of the school administration, a malt and/or a cold drink machine; the proceeds will go directly to the auditorium

fund. (4) Contributions for the fund shall be solicited from the community.

Plans for such a building were designed when Seaholm was built. The auditorium was never erected due to the lack of funds. Through this resolution, Student Congress hopes to help in the building of the missing auditorium.

DUE TO THE tragic death of President Kennedy, Seaholm cancelled the Nov. 22 showing of the all-school variety show, "Fun's-a-Poppin'." The second performance was given Dec. 7. The cast continued rehearsals and presented a great second showing.

University of Michigan's Dr. Loving will be the guest speaker. Members of the UN club will present a mock General Assembly.

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
