

Brother Rice, Cranbrook Post Triumphs

De La Salle Jolted, 66-51

Brother Rice outscored De La Salle in every period as the Warriors gained their first victory of the young basketball season with a 66-51 decision.

Paul Jagels, one of the leading scorers in the county last year, led the Warriors with 24 points. Bill Moore, a 9'9" senior, added 20. Brother Rice left no doubts about their capabilities in this one.

AGAINST Catholic Central, Rice attempted only 11 shots in the second half, but this time they put together a 20-point final half. Brother Rice opened up a 15-13 lead at the end of the first quarter and then widened it to 27-22 at halftime.

They totaled 18 points in the third quarter as compared to De La Salle's 11 and then put together a 21-point final stanza to overcome a desperate De La Salle rally.

W. Bloomfield Dumps N'ville In W-O Game

West Bloomfield lost three players due to fouls in their game with Northville but put together a 20-point third quarter and won the game, 58-43.

After grabbing an 11-7 first period lead, the Lakers ran into foul trouble, poor shooting and not enough rebounds. Northville outscored them, 17-10, and left the court leading, 24-17, at intermission.

The victory was the first for West Bloomfield this year. The defending Wayne-Oakland co-champs are now 1-1 in league play, after losing to Clawsonville last week.

Tim Ruen, who replaced Alox, and John Melzian, Hargreaves substitute, contributed 18 points between them to aid the Laker cause. Bob Haviland helped pull down important rebounds as West Bloomfield hung onto the lead.

Cranes Survive Late Falcon Spurt to Win

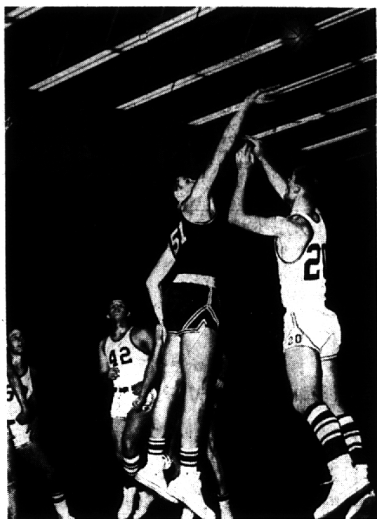
Cranbrook built up a 31-18 half-time lead, then hung on through a second-half rally by Groves, to defeat the Falcons, 59-52, Friday night.

Seaholm Shakes Off Stubborn Port Huron

Seaholm started out like a house-a-fire against Port Huron Friday night but found themselves barely avoiding an upset as the stubborn

Big Reds hung on to the end. The Maples pulled away in the final minutes to earn a 57-48 victory after Port Huron had narrowed the gap to 47-44 late in the final quarter.

The victory put Seaholm atop the Eastern Michigan League in a tie for first with surprising Hazel Park, who bounced Roseville, 60-44.

SEAHOLM LED all the way against Port Huron, but the issue wasn't settled until the Maples hit for eight consecutive points in the final stages of the contest.

Seaholm was led by 15-point scorers Ron Jacobson and Bruce Nyberg. Teammate Harold Wilbur chipped in with 11 and Mark Fritz, one of many Seaholm players over six feet, grabbed 15 rebounds.

Port Huron had 17 points from Dave Schultz and 13 from Doug Mires. The Big Red outscored Seaholm (17-11) in the third quarter, after trailing 29-23 at half.

Seaholm, appearing a little lax at times after their impressive win over Ferndale, opened a 10-2 lead in the early minutes of the game, but failed to hit as well until its fourth period burst.

WIN DUAL SWIM MEETS

Maples, Falcons Victorious

Seaholm and Groves' swimming teams traveled to enemy pools to open the dual meet season Friday and both returned with victories etched in their trunks.

The state Class A defending champion Maples dunded Ferndale, 63-42, to gain their 31st dual meet win over a three-year period.

Pete Adams, All-State transfer from Detroit Peshing, set a pool record of 4:17.1 in the 400-free style. Lynn Smith of Seaholm also set a pool record in the 200-free style with a time of 2:01.

ALL-AMERICAN breaststroke performer Dave Zimmer broke the pool record in the 100-breaststroke, churning the distance in 1:08.1 to give the Maples another first.

Ferndale salvaged a pool and a school record in the individual medley relay by Dave Fachine and a school record by Dennis White in the breaststroke.

Seaholm swept eight of the 11 events, Ferndale placing first in the 50-free style, 200-individual medley and the diving competition. Other Maples victories, besides

the record-breaking swims, were by Dennis Rozema (59.7) in the 100-butterfly, Mark Cameron (56.2) in the 100-free style and Dave Nelson (1:03.9) in the 100-breaststroke.

BIRMINGHAM swimmers took both relays. Ted Bates, Ken Bradburn, Ted Blake and Jeff Straight won the 200-medley relay in 1:53.2, while Bill Kennedy, Bruce Cranauer, Chuck Goggin and Chuck Moseley won the 200-free style relay in 1:38.3.

Groves Matmen Pinned By Crane Squad, 41-13

Cranbrook and Groves tangled for the first time on the wrestling mat and the Cranes came away with an impressive 41-13 edge.

Groves, a newcomer to the wrestling clan this year, won only three events against a more experienced Cranbrook squad. The Cranes captured nine divisions.

The match featured nine pins, seven by Cranbrook and two by the Falcons. The other three events ended in decisions.

ROBERT BONAHUE of Cranbrook won the 55-pound class when he pinned his opponent and Brock Landry gave the Cranes a 10-0 lead when he won the 103-pound division, also on a pin.

Groves got right back in the thick of the match when Jerry Griggs dropped Cranbrook's Vince Leone with a pin to win the 112-pound division.

But, from that point on, it was all Cranbrook as the Cranes pulled

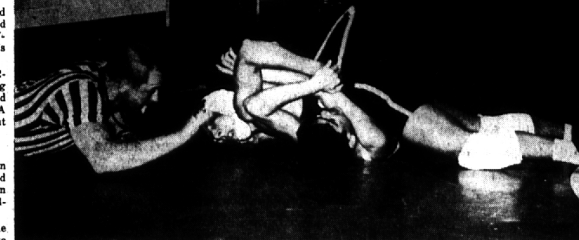
away. Two straight pins by Ed Wilson in the 120-pound class and junior Lance Leithauer in the 127-pound class stretched Cranbrook's lead to 20-5.

Groves won a decision in the 132-pound division to make the running score, 20-8, but the Falcons could manage only one more victory. A pin in the 180-division rounded out Groves' 13-point total.

RICH KIRTZ and John Goodman defeated their men in the 138 and 145-pound classes and Les Reizen pinned his opponent at the 154-pound level.

The last two Crane wins came in the 165-pound class with Dave Weidmeyer pinning his opponent, and captain Tom Barlow winning the heavyweight match on a pin.
