Country Day 57-52 Losers To Emmanuel

Detroit Country Day, showing signs of an improved basketball squad under coach John Hannett, ran into Emmanuel Christian and Ralph Wingsel Friday, and came up on the short end of a 57-52 score.

Wingate, the county's leading scorer last year, poured in 23 points and led the winners throughout the contest.

Mike Dunn, Country Day's top scorer this season, tanned 19 points and picked off 12 rebounds, while teammate Paul Sonda added 14 points, all of them in the second half.

THE GAME started in what looked like a possible rout, as Emmanuel Christian led, 18-7, at the end of the first quarter. But, the Yellowjackets outscored their opponents, 17-16, in the second stanza.

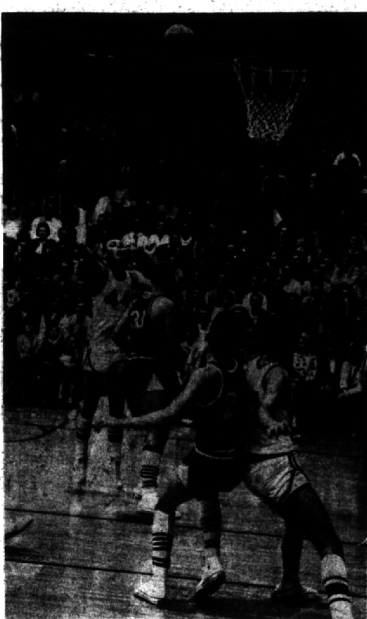
Country Day never gave up, even though they trailed by as much as 18 points in the second quarter. Their late drive fell just short of Emmanuel in the final period.

Organization has been completed for the \$200,000 Carling World Golf Championship, the first international tournament and richest purse in golf history, to be held next Aug. 27-30 at Oakland Hills Country Club.

General Chairman Harrison W. Wilder announced key committee appointments. They are: C. Norman Fry, promotion committee; L. Ralph Mason, operations committee; C. Boyd Stockman, house and finance committee.

OFFICIAL NOTICE PROPOSED RESOLUTION VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN

The following resolution was offered by Councilman J. Robert Mitchell and seconded by Councilman Robert Winkel:

1. Whereas, the Village Council of the Village of Franklin, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, deems it advisable to amend Chapter II, Section 2, Sub-section (1) of the Village Charter by providing that the Village Council shall have the authority to acquire personal property of a value greater than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for any public use or purpose within the scope of its powers, and to hold, manage, control, or otherwise dispose of the same without approval of the electorate;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Council of the Village of Franklin, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, hereby proposes that sub-section (1), Section 2, Chapter II of the Village Charter be amended as follows:

- Section 2. The Village shall have the power:
 - (1) To acquire by purchase, gift or lease, personal property of a value not to exceed \$5,000.00 for any public use or purpose within the scope of its powers and to hold, manage, control, sell or otherwise dispose of the same without approval of the electorate;
 - (2) That the Village Clerk shall submit a certified copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of Michigan for his approval or disapproval of said amendment.
 - (3) The foregoing charter amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the village for their adoption or rejection at the regular village election to be held on Monday, March 3, 1964.
 - (4) That the Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of the registration of electors prior to said regular village election by publishing the same twice in each of the Birmingham Eccentric and Southfield News, newspapers of general circulation in the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, and by posting the same in at least ten public places in said village.
 - (5) That the Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of said regular village election by publishing the same twice in said Birmingham Eccentric and Southfield News. That the said notice of regular village election shall contain in part the said proposed charter amendment in full. That the first publication of said notice of regular village election shall be not less than two (2) weeks nor more than four (4) weeks prior to the date of such election. The said notice shall also be posted by said Village Clerk in ten (10) public places in said village.
 - (6) That the proposed charter amendment shall be placed upon the ballot in the following form, with provision for voting "yes" or "no" upon the adoption thereof, to-wit:

CHARTER AMENDMENT
Shall Chapter II, Section 2, Sub-section (1) of the Charter of the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, be amended so as to give the Village power: (1) to acquire by purchase, gift or lease, personal property of a value not to exceed \$5,000.00 for any public use or purpose within the scope of its powers and to hold, manage, control, sell or otherwise dispose of the same without approval of the electorate?

That said proposed charter amendment in full shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the polling place.

That the polling places for said election shall be open from 7:30 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, said election day and such polling place shall be located as follows:
