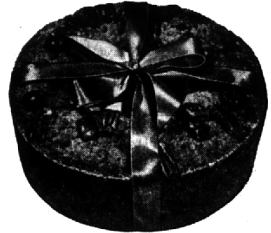
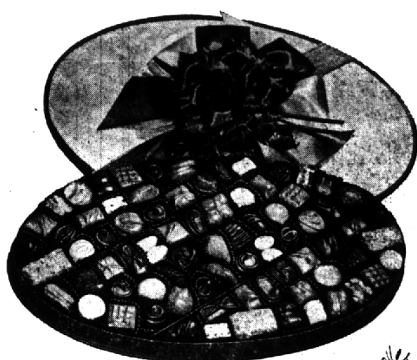

when they were adopted by the House of Burgesses at Williamsburg as the Virginia Declaration of Rights.
GEORGE MASON called for Revolution three weeks before Jefferson's Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia.
Jefferson admittedly drew upon Mason's philosophy and wording in phrasing the Declaration of Independence.
Moreover, George Mason's words were translated into French by Benjamin Franklin and became part and parcel of the French Declaration of the Rights of Man. When the United Nations drafted its Declaration of Human Rights, the famous ideas of George Mason were echoed again.
IT IS puzzling that Mason's role in the founding of democracy is not more generally recognized, but this situation is rapidly being remedied, partly through the official recognition of Bill of Rights Day.
No longer forgotten, George Mason does indeed "belong to the ages."

THIS YEAR Kingswood and Cranbrook are jointly supporting two foster children, a girl from the Philippines, Elizabeth Amores, and a Greek boy, George Konstantinidis.
Through the Foster Parents Plan Inc., the Kingswood and Cranbrook Student Fund raised by Cabinet has been contributing \$200 per year for each child. This money pays for the children's clothing, medicine, food, and school supplies.
Every month the school receives a letter from each and a student from here writes to each of them. The letters are translated in New York and sent on. The schools have been contributing to Elizabeth's support since May, but George is new to the plan.
THE SEVENTH graders performed their annual Christmas program on Wednesday, Dec. 11. Under the direction of Miss Seifert they sang "Christmas Cantata," by Spitta based on the carols "Lo, How a Rose" and "Susanni."
