The James Barrie classic will be presented in 12 performances by

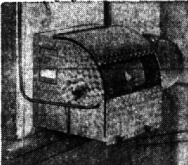
the Theatre Arts Department.

**OFFICIAL NOTICE PROPOSED RESOLUTION**

**VILLAGE OF FRANKLIN OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN**

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Robert Wink and seconded by Councilman J. Robert Mitchell:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, as follows:

- That the said Council hereby proposes that Chapter IX of the Village Charter be amended by adding thereto a Section 12 which shall read as follows:  
Section 12. The Council, subject to the applicable provisions of law, may borrow money and issue general obligations of the village to finance the improvement of streets in the village with the approval by a 3/5 vote of the electors of the village voting upon the question at an annual or special village election held during the year 1964.
- That the Village Clerk shall submit a certified copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of Michigan for his approval or disapproval of said amendment.
- The foregoing charter amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the village for their adoption or rejection at the regular village election to be held on Monday, March 9, 1964.
- That the Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of the registration of electors prior to said regular village election by publishing the same twice in each the Birmingham Eccentric and Southfield News, newspapers of general circulation in the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, and by posting the same in at least ten public places in said village.
- That the Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of said regular village election by publishing the same twice in said Birmingham Eccentric and Southfield News. That the said notice of regular village election shall contain in part the said proposed charter amendment in full. That the first publication of said notice of regular village election shall be not less than two (2) weeks nor more than four (4) weeks prior to the date of such election. The said notice shall also be posted by said Village Clerk in ten (10) public places in said village.
- That the proposed charter amendment shall be placed upon the ballot in the following form, with provision for voting "yes" or "no" upon the adoption thereof, to-wit:  
**CHARTER AMENDMENT**  
Shall Chapter IX of the Charter of the Village of Franklin, Oakland County, Michigan, be amended so as to permit the Village Council to borrow money and issue general obligations of the village to finance the improvement of streets in the Village upon the approval of a 3/5 vote of the electors of the village voting upon the question at an annual or special village election to be held during the year 1964?

That said proposed charter amendment in full shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the polling place.

7. That the polling place for said election be open from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on said election day and such polling place shall be located as follows: Franklin School — 32220 Franklin Road, Franklin, Michigan.

It was moved by Councilman Oberschulte and seconded by Councilman Webb that said resolution be read once and laid upon the table.

**Korean Pianist Will Be Soloist With Symphony**

Young Korean pianist Tong II Han will be soloist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra Dec. 26 and 28 at 8:30 p.m. in Ford Auditorium, Detroit.

Sixten Ehrlich will conduct the concert, the last in his current series. Ehrlich will return for programs Feb. 6-8 and will then finish out the season as the orchestra's permanent conductor.

He will play the Rachmaninoff "Concerto No. 3 in D minor" on a program which will include Schubert's "Overture to Rosamunde" and Walton's "Symphony No. 1."

Among his many honors, Tong II Han is the recipient of a special scholarship to Juilliard, a prize given by Detroit's Mrs. J. Pinkney Tuck in memory of her daughter, Martha.

The Young Artist was discovered in Korea during the recent conflict there and brought to this country at age 11 under the sponsorship of the Fifth Air Force.

He has appeared as soloist with the symphony on two previous occasions in 1959 for a concert sponsored by the Girl Scouts of Metropolitan Detroit and for the opening of the orchestra's summer season at the airgrounds in 1961.

The orchestra under Ehrlich's direction will appear at 8:15 p.m. Sunday in Cleary Auditorium, Windsor, on the Christian Culture Series of Assumption University. The program will include Brahms' "Academic Festival Overture," Beethoven's "Symphony No. 4," Mendelssohn's "Symphony No. 4" (Italian), Weinberger's "Prelude and Fugue from Schwanda" and a group of Christmas carols.
