FALCONS LOSE

Seaholm Tankers Stay Unbeaten in 2 Meets

By DICK ZEMMIN Sports Editor Seaholm's powerful defending state champions rolled up two more impressive swim victories Friday and Saturday, but Groves fell to a tough Royal Oak Kimball squad that is expected to battle Seaholm in the Eastern Michigan League.

Groves gave the Knights a battle, but just didn't have enough Friday. Coach Jim Giletter said, "The whole team was disappointed; everyone has done better in practice." The Falcon 200-medley relay team won their first event. Doug Hitch, Dave Wind, Kevin Tooma

and Chuck Mitchell won in 1:49 flat.

AFTER Kimball's Tim Cash won the 200-free style, Dave Mead knotted the score at 15-15 when he won the 50-free style in 23.7. But, from that stage on, Kimball was never headed. The only other win posted by a Groves swimmer was a fine performance by Kevin Tooma in the 100-butterfly. He churned the distance in a pool record time of 38.6.

Kimball, a strong contender for state honors, swept the other seven events. The Knights meet Seaholm Jan. 10 in an EML showdown. Meanwhile, the Maple tankers won an impressive meet over Thurston, 56-49. It was the second dual meet win of the year for Seaholm, the other coming a week ago at the expense of Ferndale.

THE MAPLES have also won the Royal Oak Relays and Saturday they captured their second relay trophy this season when they were victors at Battle Creek in the annual Cereal Bowl Relays. In the Thurston contest, Seaholm's victory was almost overshadowed by the performance of Thurston's Ken Wiebeck, heralded as the best high school swimmer in the state. Wiebeck was the only double winner. He set a pool and school record with a 1:52.9 clocking in the 200-free style, and he set a Seaholm pool record in the 100-free style at :50.0. He now holds three state freestyle records.

Groves posted its first basketball victory of the season Tuesday night as the Falcons outscored winless Oak Park, 45-39. Bill Stephenson accounted for 15 points as he led Groves over the Redskins. The win evened the school's Northwest Suburban League record at 1-1. The Falcons now are 1-3 on the season and face Seaholm (2-1) tomorrow night in the Maples' gym.

Terry Barr's receptions against the San Francisco 49ers, good for 135 yards and three touchdowns, was the best Lion pass receiving mark since 1955, and it was the best record in 100 Lion games since Lew Carpenter grabbed 10 against New York in the final game of the '55 campaign.
