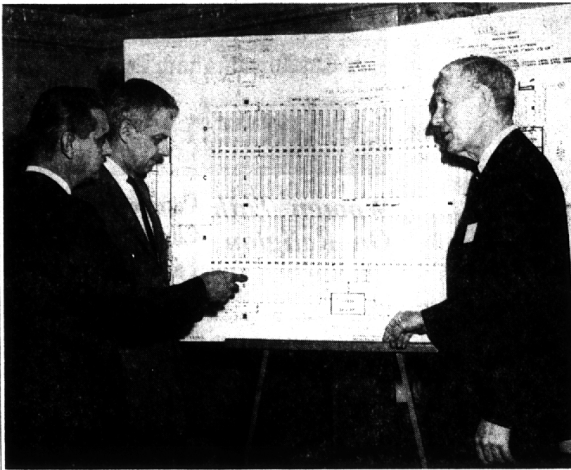

 Eventually the Youth Assistance Committee expects to publish a survey showing what youth groups exist in Birmingham, what functions they perform and what members of the committee can do to help the groups.

Sixty-five hundred scout leaders and their ladies, representing the world's largest scout council, will participate in the program. The program is designed to recognize their leadership for some 62,000 boys in this area.

Veterans To Get 1964 Dividends Beginning Jan. 2

In response to President Johnson's directive for the earliest possible payment of the \$234-million dollar GI Insurance dividend for 1964, the Veterans Administration announced that the first checks will reach veterans by Jan. 2.
 The entire payment to 4,725,000 veterans participating in the dividend will be completed in record time—by Jan. 25.
 In Michigan, 194,729 veterans will receive \$9,678,000. Robert M. Fitzgerald, VA's Regional Office Manager in Detroit, announced, Fitzgerald explained that the speed-up in payments is VA's answer to the President's request as a stimulant to the economy.

KOREAN CONFLICT veterans hold non-participating policies that do not provide regular annual dividend payments.
 The regular dividends are primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death among GI policyholders continues to be lower than the rate upon which the payments were established by law.
 Fitzgerald reminded policyholders that the preparing and mailing of dividend payments are automatic and require no correspondence from veterans or their families.
 In fact, such correspondence might delay the dividend distribution process, he said.

IN THE FIRST accelerated payment of a dividend, ordered by President Kennedy in 1961, payments were completed by March 17. The stepped-up payments of the 1964 dividend were completed last Jan. 31. The VA plan to issue the 1964 dividend checks by next Jan. 25 will cut a week from the previous record processing time of 31 days in 1963.
 The dividend payments in 1962, and in the years prior to 1961, were made throughout the entire year on the anniversary dates of the individual insurance policies.
 Of the total distribution of \$234 million, \$15 million will go to about 225,000 World War I
