# Republicans Complete Plans For Grand Rapids Conclave

Republicans are completing plans for their state convention Feb. 15-16 in Grand Rapids when statewide candidates for the spring election and Republican State Central Committee officials will be elected.

Headquarters for the two-day conclave will be the Pantlind Hotel where officials and congressional district caucuses will be held at 9 p.m. on Feb. 15 and unofficial caucuses are scheduled for 10:30 p.m.

The Feb. 16 program at the Civic Auditorium will get under way with a kick-off breakfast from 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. in the Black and Silver Room, and the convention will convene at 10:30 a.m.

**SOCIAL HIGHLIGHT** of the bi-annual conclave will be a luncheon honoring the new First Lady, Mrs. George Romney, at 12 noon Feb. 15 in the hotel ballroom. Mrs. Robert Gaunt, Kent County vice chairman, and Mrs. Donald Josephson, Kent County RSCC member, are co-chairmen of arrangements.

Delegates will elect a new state chairman to succeed George M. Van Pusem of Lansing who has announced he will not seek reelection.

Announced candidates are John A. (Jack) Gibbs of Royal Oak, Van Pusem's executive assistant and state campaign coordinator, and Arthur G. Elliott, Jr., of Bloomfield Hills, Gov. Romney's campaign manager and fellow Constitutional Convention delegate who now is serving temporarily as the governor's executive assistant for appointments and office management.

**ALSO ELECTED** WILL be the district vice chairman. Only announced candidate is Mrs. W. Merritt (Elly) Peterson of Charlotte who is completing her first term in the post.

Announced candidates for the two state Supreme Court seats and eight policy-level educational posts are:

- Supreme Court: Circuit Judge Donald E. Holbrook of Clare and Circuit Judge Richard G. Smith of Bay City.
- State Board of Education: James F. O'Neil of Livonia.
- University of Michigan Board of Regents: James Egan, principal of Brown City High School, and William R. Cudlip, Detroit attorney.
- Michigan State University Board of Trustees: Art House of Boyne City, John Mettolf of East Lansing, and Walter F. Patenge of Lansing, president of the State Chamber of Commerce.

Miss Price is an elected member of the Professional Growth Committee of the Birmingham Public Schools. She has been the advisor to the Seaholm Cheerleaders for 10 years. In 1952, she helped organize Cicerone, the student guide and usher club at Seaholm, and she is still the club advisor.

later returned General Patton's dash across Europe. Before joining the Associated Press, Wiant was for two years a reporter and editor on the Indianapolis News.

Active in civic and church work, Wiant was past president of both the Detroit chapters of Sigma Delta Chi, journalistic fraternity, and Public Relations Society of America.

HE WAS a member of the program committee of the Adcraft Club of Detroit, a member of the Economic Club of Detroit and served as public relations chairman of the National Fund for Medical Education.

Wiant also served on various committees of the Michigan Council of Advertising Agencies and the United Foundation and affiliated groups.

Wiant, who helped start many persons on careers in public relations and advertising, was born in Lagro, Ind., April 23, 1911. He completed his elementary schooling in Fort Wayne, Ind., in 1928, and in 1932 was graduated from DePauw University.

He is survived by his wife, Betty; daughter, Susan; parents, Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Wiant, of Columbus, O.; and a brother, Rev. Howard J. Wiant, of Youngstown, O.

THE BODY WAS taken to the William Vase Funeral Home in Royal Oak where it will be in state from 7 to 9 p.m. today, and at the Kirk in the Hills Friday from 2 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m.

Funeral services will take place Saturday at 3 p.m. at Kirk in the Hills Church, with burial in Mt. Calvary Cemetery, Tremont City, O. Elders of the church will be pallbearers.

In lieu of flowers, a Thornburn Wiant memorial fund has been established at Kirk in the Hills.

4. There must be 17 more good reasons for trying.

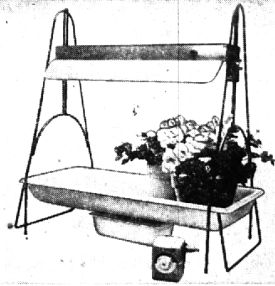
#### HOW DO WE START?

4. WHATEVER SEEDS OR PLANTS OR BULBS YOU WANT.

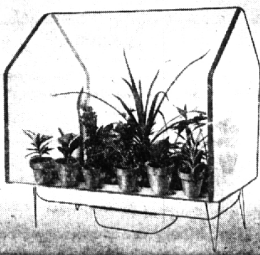
NOTE:—If you don't have any electric lights or water in your home we will find you a source.

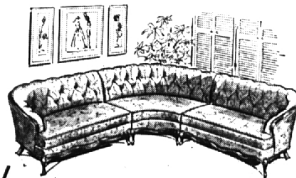

## Explain Plans For Financing County Airport

Self-liquidating revenue bonds will be used to finance Oakland County's venture into the airport business, according to present plans of Boards of Supervisors' leaders.

The proposal was made in a letter from the Supervisors' Aviation Committee which is scheduled to be mailed shortly seeking public support.

The county proposal includes enlarging Allen Airport to enable it to serve more single and double-engine planes owned by private persons and corporations. The county already has \$367,000 invested in the project.

THE AVIATION Committee desires city and village councils and township boards—as well as influential citizens—to express their views on the airport venture to the Federal Aviation Agency in Kansas City before Feb. 15.

The letter stated that the proposal is for a general airport with no major jet passenger service and that no general tax funds be needed for the airport development.

Industrial development around the airport is seen as producing "ample" personal property tax income to help with school taxes and will tend to reduce property tax rates rather than increase them. Completion of the airport is projected for 1970-75.

## Rev. Schneider Receives Orders In Trinity Rites

The Rev. Edward N. Schneider will receive orders as an Episcopal priest in 1942, at 10 a.m. Saturday in Trinity Episcopal Church, St. Clair Shores.

Rev. Schneider, a deacon since last June, is vicar in charge of the Fraser mission of St. Edward the Confessor, Birmingham.

He is a graduate of Cranbrook High School, received a BA degree from UCLA in 1949, and graduated from the Virginia Theological Seminary, Alexandria, Va., in 1952.

Rev. Schneider is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis J. Schneider of 1430 Inwood Circle, Bloomfield Hills. He and his wife, the former Joan McBride of Birmingham, reside in Warren with their infant son, Edward N., Jr.

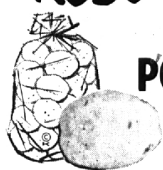
