

Townships' Field Lists Primary Candidates

Voters in the Feb. 18 primary election will narrow down the field for certain offices in two townships and the City of Southfield.

In Bloomfield Township, three Republicans will vote for nomination for two trustee posts, each for a term of four years. They are Robert A. Reid, incumbent, Frederick A. Chapman and Robert M. Sinclair. They are Robert M. Sinclair, who is a Republican.

No other primary contests have shaped up in this area. All the remaining candidates are running on the GOP ticket.

IN WEST Bloomfield, the election will feature an innovation in the introduction of a partisan factor for the first time. Thirteen Republicans and three Citizens Party candidates will be listed on the ballot.

There will be primary races for three posts in West Bloomfield. Three men, Walter J. Whitmer, and Charles B. Forbes, both incumbents, and Donald Watkins, will contend for the Republican nomination for two trustee posts, each for four-year terms.

One board of review nomination is sought by two GOP candidates, John N. Doherty and W. J. Saunders. Three other Republicans will run for a single justice of the peace nomination. They are Robert F. Scott, incumbent, and Christian E. Powell and Arthur J. Rubiner.

IN THE City of Southfield, voters will face a choice of 10 candidates for eight nominations for four council openings. Four seeking nomination are incumbents O. David Edwards, John J. Hollywood, Thomas Rowley and Clarence A. Durbin. The remaining five are James A. Julian, Walter Meas, James E. Wells, Elizabeth Molnar, Will J. Oliver and Jean McDonald.

Three of the positions are for four-year terms and one for a two-year term. A fifth council term opening will not appear on the primary ballot but will provide a contest in the April 1 election between Alex C. Fernoff and Thomas P. Saks.

THE CITY will not include the names of mayoral candidates or those of persons filing for clerk and treasurer in the primary election. Voters will cast their choice for these posts in the spring election. The only race involved among this group of posts is between incumbent Mayor James Clarkson and C. Hugh Johnson, current council president.

The Southfield city election is nonpartisan.

SOUTHFIELD Township will have no primary inasmuch as no contests have shaped up. The ballot will be presented in the spring election, however.

In all three townships, the April 1 election will fill posts as follows: two clerk and treasurer, for two-year terms in each case. Two trustee posts will be filled in each area for four-year terms and a single justice of the peace and one board of review member will be chosen, each for a term of four years.

Bloomfield and Southfield townships will each elect a constable for two years in the spring election and Bloomfield will also elect a highway commissioner for a two-year term.

West Bloomfield has openings for two constables for two-year terms. The only man to file, however, is Joseph D. Nephew, incumbent. He is the only other without a candidate.

THE CANDIDATES, then, who will be listed on the primary ballots, along with biographical information and statements follow:

Bloomfield Township
HOMER CASE, 47, of 839 Helston Drive, is seeking the post of township supervisor. He is presently a director of the township. The father of three sons, Case attended Bloomfield Hills High School and is an elder in the Church of Christ. He is a member of the Bloomfield Lions Club, Bloomfield Republican Club and Oakland County Treasurers Association.

CASE SAYS, "As a lifelong resident of Bloomfield Township, I feel qualified to become supervisor, due to my past experience with township government; my duty as treasurer for the past 10 years and the responsibility of upgrading the fire and police departments, along with working with the water and sewer departments since their beginnings.

"I feel qualified to be a member of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors to insure proper representation for the people of Bloomfield Township."

ARNO HULET, seeking the office of treasurer, is the current township supervisor. Living on Franklin Road, he is 68 and the father of two sons. He holds a BA degree and did graduate work at the University of Detroit. He is a member of the American Legion, the Masons, Lions Club, Hi-12 Club and the Congregation Church.

Hulet says, "I believe I am qualified because I have been on the Bloomfield Township Board for 30 years; 17 years as trustee, 12 years as supervisor and treasurer and 2 years as auditor. I served 2

years in the U.S. Army—1 year in France—and I am also a retired school teacher (30 years). I served 10 years in the Michigan State Police and Oakland County Juvenile Home."

DEBORIS V. LITTLE, 41, of 1182 Franklin Road, seeks re-election as township clerk. She is the mother of two daughters and holds a degree in business administration. She is active in church work, a member of the Republican Club and the national PEO.

Little says, "I feel qualified to continue as clerk because of my past experience with Bloomfield Township. Prior to this township I had been with the township for six years in the treasurer's office and had been secretary for the planning commission and board of appeals. I also worked with the Oakland County Treasurer's office for several years."

ROBERT A. REID, 45, of 344 Tibury Road, incumbent trustee, seeks re-election. Two other men, Walter J. Whitmer and Charles B. Forbes, both incumbents, and Donald Watkins, will contend for the Republican nomination for two trustee posts, each for four-year terms.

One board of review nomination is sought by two GOP candidates, John N. Doherty and W. J. Saunders. Three other Republicans will run for a single justice of the peace nomination. They are Robert F. Scott, incumbent, and Christian E. Powell and Arthur J. Rubiner.

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He says, "The office of justice of the peace needs a person with patience and understanding in dealing with young people. Over 70 per cent of cases involve persons under 23 years of age. In working with these young people, I have had to handle numerous letters I thank me for the consideration they receive in my court."

NO BIOGRAPHICAL information or statement was received from Karl Rhodes, 645 Franklin Road, who seeks the office of constable, nor from John G. Romney, 1440 Marquis Lane, who filed for highway commissioner.

West Bloomfield

JOHN C. REHARD (R), 59, incumbent township supervisor, will run for re-election. He is the president of 6790 E. Dartmouth Road, he is the father of one child and attended Ohio State University and has a master's degree in mechanical safety engineering for the Detroit Dept. of Buildings and Safety Engineering and is a past president of his local subdivision. He is a member of the National Association of Counties and the National Association of Supervisors.

He says, "I am a professional engineer registered in Michigan and Ohio and have more than 25 years of experience in engineering the fields of government operations and government administration. I participated in continuing education with such courses as 'Public Relations in Government' and 'Technique of Municipal Administration' to help to reverse downward trends in West Bloomfield Township and to establish sound concepts of orderly development and planning."

ARTHUR A. ROSSNER, a member of the Citizens Party, is 42 and lives at 2015 E. River Road. He is the supervisor's nomination. He is an attorney and owner of Sylvan Park. He has four children, a law degree and has worked in the U.F. March of Dimes and is a member of the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star.

He says, "The office for which I am running is a position that I believe that good citizenship means taking part in one of the political parties and running for office in order to help the township. I have always been interested in township government but due to my business activities, I have not been able to seek any political office. I believe that any person on the township board presents a challenge to me."

ROBERT FOR SCOTT (R), 43, of 2031 Mapleview, seeks re-election as justice of the peace against James A. Julian, Walter Meas, James E. Wells, Elizabeth Molnar, Will J. Oliver and Jean McDonald. He is a manager of Mills Products, Inc., Walled Lake, and attended the U. of D. He has two children and has served as JP post for two terms.

He has served as a volunteer fireman in the township and is a member of the Oakland County Judicial Association, vice president and secretary of the Cass Lakeside Community Association and Cass Lake Community Center.

Scott says, "Having held the office of justice of the peace for over a year, I have been active in state and county judicial associations (the latter as an officer). I can bring to the office the considerable experience of over a thousand court cases and a complete knowledge of the problems attendant to the office."

CHRISTIAN E. POWELL (R), 31, of 7618 Barnsbury, seeks the post of township JP and is an attorney. He holds a law degree from the University of Michigan and is a member of the Detroit County Bar and the Detroit County of Law. He has four children. He holds a post on the township board of review and is a member of state and county bar associations.

He says, "I am seeking the office of justice of the peace because I believe our township should have a justice court that will provide the township with a civil docket, as well as a criminal docket, as the present situation. I am further convinced that the adoption of a new constitution for Michigan will result in a definite need, if not a requirement, for attorneys to preside in our justice courts and therefore I would like to begin now to recognize this responsibility by seeking this office."

ARTHUR J. RUBINER (R), 36, of 4232 Northford Road, is an attorney with a law degree from the U. of D. He seeks the justice post. Married, he was the chairman for UP and a committee member in both the Detroit and state bar associations.

He says, "As a practicing lawyer, teacher of law and experienced arbitrator, I would like to contribute toward the rescue of a basic judicial office, which has fallen into and regularly disavowed. I would establish reasonably uniform fines and a uniformly functioning civil court. For this, West Bloomfield needs a lawyer as its JP."

WARD SAUNDERS (R), 67, of 3379 Wards Point Drive, is retired from Mowat Wilson Co., Detroit. He studied business administration at LaSalle Extension University. He is the father of two children, is active in church work and a member of the Masons and the Southfield Lions Club.

He says, "The board of review should be filled by representatives from all areas of the township. My place of residence is different from that of other members. My age and business experience are different from the judgment and viewpoint necessary to properly evaluate the problems of the taxpayer who will appear before the board of review."

THE OTHER contender for the board of review is James A. Julian, Doherty, 5231 W. Doherty Drive, who will provide biographical information nor a statement.

JOE D. NEPHEW (R), 46, of 4036 Highland Court, is the incumbent constable. He is the only candidate for the office. A high school graduate, he is the father of two children. He serves as a volunteer fireman in the department, and the sheriff's water patrol. He is a member of the West Bloom-

field Goodfellows and the F and AM, 121.

He says, "I want to help our township and be a better place to live in and to help people."

MRS. LAURENCE BENTON (R), 47, of 2325 Scotch Pine Drive, is seeking re-election for a six-year term on the library board. She has given me a considerable knowledge of township affairs. Experience as an appointee to the library board and participation in the library board's activities have given me practical understanding of library problems."

WILLIAM J. DEVERES, JR. (Citizens Party), 38, of 7359 Buckhorn Road, is the other candidate for nomination. He is a teacher in the township and holds a law degree from the U. of D. and has five children. President of West Bloomfield P.T.A., a Calumet and a Sunday school teacher at his church.

He says, "In 1961, I was appointed to fill a vacant, unexpired term. There is still a great deal to be done and I feel that it is my duty to continue to do more important. I feel that every citizen has a responsibility, or better phrased, a duty to participate in government affairs."

CAROL H. SADER (Citizens Party), 27, of 7496 Corbally Court, is seeking re-election for a six-year term on the library board. She is a teacher in the township and holds a law degree from the U. of D. and has two children.

She is chairman of the foreign economy policy committee of the L.W.V., a board member of the Mayfair Cooperative Nursery and a member of Hadassah, B'nai B'rith, the U.S. Red Cross, the National Club, efficiently-run public library is an absolute essential to any alert community and it is my belief that the community to see to it that such a facility is available.

As a citizen of West Bloomfield, I appreciate the fine library we now have and I feel a responsibility to contribute my energies toward the maintenance and continued improvement. I believe that my services would be of value to the township and the citizens of the following qualifications:

Of my background in education and teaching; my work during the past year in the Michigan Library System and the Barnard College Library. I also helped to organize a public library in Morris, Conn., and have had recent experience in organizational work.

City of Southfield Council Candidates Only
JOHN J. HOLLYWOOD, 54, of 27389 Shagbark Drive, is a finance broker, a high school graduate and attended night school in engineering drafting. He is married and was elected to the city council one year ago. He has served on the Southfield Township Board and on the city charter commission and is a founder member and past president of the Rotary Club and a member of the Oakland County Rock Club.

He says, "I am the only incumbent with pre-city experience on the Southfield Township Board. I was then elected to two charter commissions and served as a member of the township board of review, which wrote the charter under which we now operate in the city. I was elected to the council in April, 1958, and re-elected in April, 1961."

THOMAS ROWLEY, 37, of 28670 Stuart, is a communication consultant for the Michigan Telephone Co., Detroit, and attended the University of Illinois. He has two children.

A past member of the zoning commission, he is presently on the city council and is president of the Bonnie Acres Improvement Association. He is a member of the U.S. Navy and the Southfield Lions Club.

Rowley says, "Since the incorporation of Southfield in 1958, I have taken an active interest in our city affairs. I have attended all of the city council meetings since incorporation and served as a member of the city zoning board from 1958 through 1959. I have had the pleasure of serving a councilman for the past two years, based on my past record as a legislative head of the city. I believe that I qualify for re-election to the office."

CLARENCE A. DURBIN, 54, of 1915 W. Durbin, holds a BS degree in architectural engineering and is self-employed as a designer and builder. He has served on the township zoning board and the board of appeals and on the city zoning board and was a member of its first charter commission.

An incumbent on the city council, he is active in the local Goodfellows and Upterrans. On the county level in

government, he is a member of the board of supervisors, the county board of education, and the state and special government study committee.

O. DAVID EDWARDS is the remaining incumbent; councilman seeking re-election, did not submit biographical information nor a statement.

JAMES J. JULIAN, 39, of 30561 Balmwood, is an attorney and has been in the law for two years and is in labor relations with the Acorn Aluminum Products Co.

He is active on the mayor's citizen advisory committee, the Southfield Civic Council and is a deputy director of civil defense.

He says, "As a member of the mayor's citizen advisory committee and deputy director of civil defense, I have been exposed to the physical characteristics, community and individual problems of our city. Labor relations condition one's approach to whatever comes before him in an unbiased, equitable manner."

MRS. ELIZABETH MOLNAR, 25, of 2582 Route Court, holds a master's degree from WSU and is the mother of one daughter. A previous charter commissioner, she participated in the Oakland County library survey; helped organize the League of Women Voters in Southfield and was active in the organization of the Southfield chapter, Citizens for Michigan.

She is a member of the Rouge-Mott-Rougewood-Hiddesheim Civic Association, the Southfield Improvement Association, Southfield Area Civic Association and other organizations.

She says, "Many individuals (representing a cross-section of Southfield) initiated and helped circulate nominating petitions in my behalf and asked that I accept the candidacy. The request seemed sincere, free of any special interests and aimed to combat election apathy. For these reasons, I am willing to serve the people of Southfield on the council."

It is my belief that the council should act in cooperation with the executive division for the good of the city. Taxes should remain at the present level if at all possible."

JAMES E. WELLS, 31, of 19831 Saxon, is a finance and wholesale lumber executive at the Wells Lumber Co. and holds a bachelor's degree. He is the father of three sons. He is active in Little League Baseball, Cub Scouting, P.T.A. and the Southfield Boosters Club.

He says, "I will bring to office my legal, engineering and accounting education along with this program's honest representation of the public; abolishment of private council meetings at public expense; barring councilman's travel expense; inclusion of budget with every tax bill; filling of gaps in present laws; holding to the present tax level; and immediate adoption of the master plan."

MRS. JEAN MCDONNELL, 19860 W. 12 Mile Road, is self-employed as a shopkeeper and took two years of business administration. She has served on the Southfield Township zoning board and planning and advisory board on the Southfield City Council in the past.

She was legislative chairman of the Business and Professional Women's Club Southfield, active in the Southfield L.W.V., Friends of the Library, program chairman of the Southfield Optimum Club and the only woman in 1962 to appear on the Southfield Goodfellows.

She says, "Dedicated public servants are necessary to preserve our form of government. I have an eight years of business administration, giving them my strength, courage and ability. This is not political maneuvering. There is proof of record of years of devoted service rendered whenever and wherever I was needed."
