Revenue Director Reminds Taxpayers Of Savings Option

Taxpayers are reminded by R. I. Nixon, district director of the Internal Revenue Service, of the new plan allowing them to take their tax refunds in United States Savings Bonds.

The Director states that beginning with the 1962 individual income tax return, eligible taxpayers will be given the opportunity of taking their refunds in Series E Savings Bonds in addition to the standard options of cash or applying the refund to next year's tax.

When Savings Bonds are chosen, the smallest possible number of the highest denomination bonds will be issued, along with a check to cover any remaining balance of a dollar or more.

The director adds that the tax forms, 1040 (long) and 1040A (short), have been changed to provide an extra space in which taxpayers may elect U. S. Savings Bonds for their refunds. Information on the option also appears in the instructions for both of these forms.

Road Program Provides Jobs

The Michigan State Highway Department in Lansing made payments totaling \$168 million to highway contractors during 1962.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said payments were about \$52 million less than 1961 when payments totaled a record \$210 million. Payments to contractors for work completed during 1960 totaled \$161 million.

"DURING THE LAST three years, the Highway Department paid contractors more than half a billion dollars for work completed," Mackie said. "This provided full-time jobs for an estimated 15,500 men during the three-year period."

"Michigan's highway program is making a major contribution to the state's economy and is being felt in every sector of the economy."

At the start of 1963, Michigan had a backlog of \$135 million worth of highway construction projects under contract but not completed, Mackie said.

Contractors are paid as they complete work on Highway Department projects or for material delivered to the construction site.
