Following the business meeting, Mrs. Owen J. Wallace presented a program on "Trends in Modern Art".



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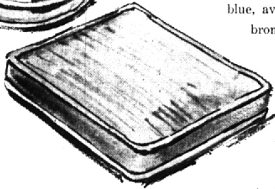

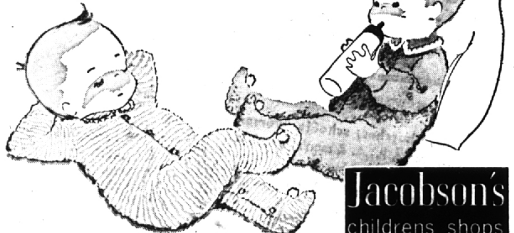


Becomes Bride
