Thus the first steps have been taken to formally begin the Franklin Historical Society which will be affiliated with the Michigan State Historical Society.

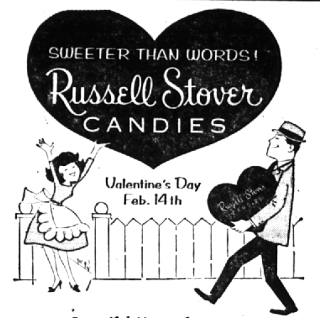

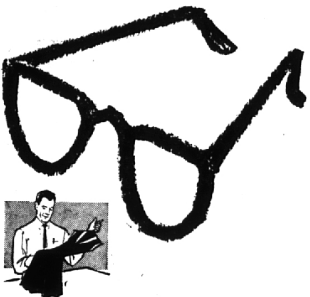
