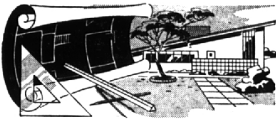


**Instructor Change**

**The Three Keys to Success: Devotion, Dedication, Drag**

As a public service to our readers we are proud to bring you the story of Fenwick Van Bluster, III, which proves that in this highly competitive world opportunities for success are still plentiful for the man who has what it takes. We call it the three D's—Devotion, Dedication—and Drag.

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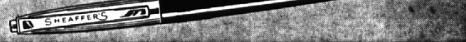
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
