His name is legend among those who follow the fast growing sport of swimming. High school swimmers in this area are still trying to break the records he set four years ago. He swam the 100-yard freestyle in 50.4 in the 100-yard freestyle.

THE OLDEST state high school record in the world is held by Pete's time of 50.4 in the 100-yard freestyle.

AT INDIANA, University Pete swam to more records and honors. He was Big Ten champion in a number of events during the previous year. He swam the freestyle leg on a medley relay team that lowered the world record almost every time it swam the event during a two-year span.

He is amazingly versatile—one of the very few swimmers who can excel at any distance from 50 yards to 1,500 meters. Recently his coach, Dr. James Connelman, was quoted in a Detroit newspaper as saying, "It will take at least two boys to replace Sintz."

Pete never had a chance to be a national collegiate champion. The N.C.A.A. ruled all Indiana University teams out of national championship meets for four years because of football recruiting violations. (Surely one of the most unjust decisions ever handed down in amateur sports.)
