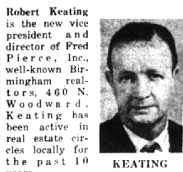


# Behind The Store Fronts

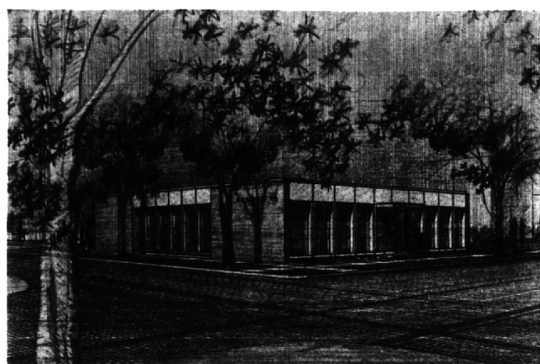
