

Wood Paces Area Skiers in Mt. Holly Meet

Seven Others Dominate in Junior Finals

Dick Wood of Bloomfield Hills set a torrid pace Saturday on the slopes of Mt. Holly as skiers from the Birmingham-Bloomfield area dominated competition in the Michigan Open Ski Meet.

Wood, 16, a sophomore at Bloomfield Hills High School and a member of a prominent figure skating family, posted the fastest individual run of the day with a time of 20.6 seconds. He chalked up a time of 42.1 seconds for two runs in defeating a field of 59 youngsters in the 15-17 age group.

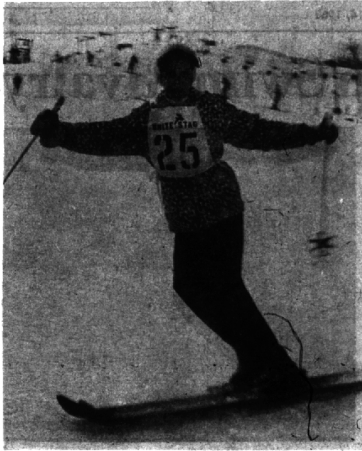
A TOTAL of eight area skiers placed first, second or third in the tight classes, which saw a record number of 189 youngsters compete in the junior competition. Scores of youngsters from Birmingham and the Hills participated in the meet.

Jacqueline Jacques, 13, of 4735 Walnut Lake Road, Birmingham, topped the girl's 13-14 age group with a combined time of 58.6. It was her second straight triumph in as many years.

Pam Waggoner, 17, of 1662 Grosvenor Road, Bloomfield Hills, edged out Jane Tripp of Waterford, by a tenth of a second to emerge victorious in the girls' 15-17 bracket. Her combined time was 57.3 seconds.

SCOTT McLEAN, 11, of 5625 Forman, Birmingham, defeated 37 other boys in the 11-12 age group with a combined time of 48.4 seconds. Scott posted a two-second margin over second-place finisher Bloomfield Hills.

Four Birmingham area companies will have exhibits at the fifth annual Greater Michigan Boat Show opening at noon Saturday at the Detroit Artillery Armory on W. Eight Mile near Greenfield.

They are the Birmingham Boat Center, 1295 S. Woodward, Birmingham; Johnnie's Boat Service, 24430 W. 10 Mile and Raupp Trailer Sales, 28625 Telegraph, both of Southfield; and The Silverwolf, Inc., 4100 N. Woodward, Royal Oak.

THE SHOW will feature more than 500 boats of all kinds, from family runabouts to big cabin cruisers and sailboats. Included among the more than 150 exhibits is every conceivable kind of water sports equipment, from snorkels to fog horns.

The event is sponsored by the Michigan Marine Dealers Association (MMDA) and will run through Sunday, Feb. 24. Show hours are noon to 10 p.m.

Unveiled at the boat show will be the jet-powered Miss Stars and Stripes. The aluminum, Michigan-made hydroplane was built by Les Staudacher for industrialist Robert B. Evans.

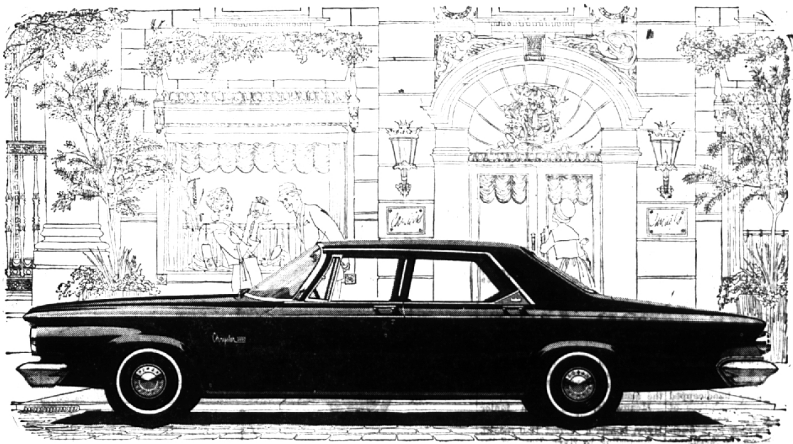
OTHER PUBLIC service displays include Shirley McDonald's Miss Notre Dame, newest unlimited class hydroplane, plus the champion hydroplane from each class of racing powerboats.
