Behind the Welcome Mat

"All the world's a stage, and all the men and women in it merely players. They have their exits and their entrances; and one man in his time plays many parts." This quote from Shakespeare fits in perfectly with some ideas I have run across recently concerning role-playing. Leave it to the hard to be as up to date as any 20th century free thinker. Anyway, it seems that how well we play our many parts determines how well we adapt to modern living.

In his book, "The Lonely Crowd" David Riesman feels that women are better role-players than men. He says that not only do men not know how to change roles, but also they don't mark the change by proper costuming indicated for instance by the decline of evening dress among males.

I SHOULD extend his point about women. I think today's housewife should be nominated as the champion role-player of all time. During the day she is a fair y self-sufficient, jans-of-all-trades, who can wield a mean shovel in the garden, take care of the house, make minor mechanical repairs with a screw driver and a few hairpins, pound a golf ball down a fairway or referee fights between her children. For an evening on the town she can switch and become a helpless, elegant creature, too fragile to walk a block to get in the car, open a door or light her own cigarette.

RIESMAN SAYS today's businessman is still a businessman whether he is at work or a dinner party. True enough, I suppose, but within the scope of his career a man must often play more than one role . . . same gray flannel suit, but different personality. To his subordinates he is the boss—the person to whom they report, the one who hands out

assignments and settles their problems. However, to the company manager or vice president our friend is just another subordinate and he must follow the directions passed down to him.

AT ONE meeting he may be a discussion leader, at another, a member of the discussion group.

A salesman is called upon to play many roles during a day's activities—to one client he is a father-confessor, to another a hard-headed businessman, to a third, a joke-telling friend.

The average man does not think of himself as an actor, partly because this would smack of phyness, but it would help if he did. A good actor tries to stay flexible and he shies away from being type-casted.

THE MAN who can lay aside his career parts at the end of the day and assume the role of father and husband as he drives home from work is going to be happier and less troubled than the one who remains type-casted in his career part.

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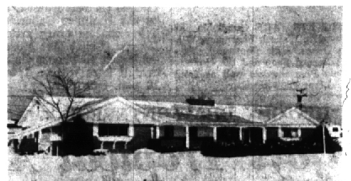
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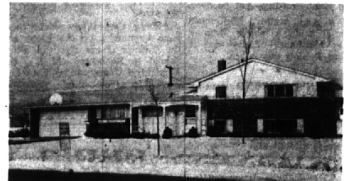
