Area Residents Appointed To Detroit Olympics Group

Forty-three Birmingham-Bloomfield area residents were among those appointed to committees by the United States Olympic Committee last October to be the U.S. contender for the games. The local group, along with representatives of other metropolitan leaders of business, industry, labor and government, met with Cavanaugh and Gov. George Romney in Detroit Monday to map plans for the effort. The 200-man group was divided into 15 sub-committees to cover every aspect of the games from the housing of the athletes to programming the games. GOV. ROMNEY told the group the entire state is uniting in an effort to bring the games to Detroit. He said the state would make every effort not to let Los Angeles challenge go unanswered. Detroit had been authorized by the U.S. Olympic Committee last October to be the U.S. contender for the games. Two weeks ago, Los Angeles persuaded that committee to reconsider the list of American contenders at its March 18-19 meeting in New York. Along with L.A., San Francisco and Portland, Ore., are expected to make bids. ROMNEY SAID that the government would make every effort to set up an authority and give it the power to construct a 100,000-seat, \$25 million stadium at the fairgrounds. Douglas Roby, a Detroit who is a member of the U.S. committee, said the stadium is the most important thing in the outlining of the games. Cavanaugh termed the Los Angeles action "unprecedented and unsportsmanlike and totally inconsistent with the tradition of the Olympic Games."
