Shall the Charter of the Village of Beverly Hills be amended by the addition of a new subsection to be known as Sub-Section 1.10 (a), reading as follows:

Section 1.10 (a). Effective on the first day after the regular Village Election in 1961, notwithstanding any other provision or provisions of this charter, the office of Village Clerk shall be filled thusly. The Clerk shall be elected by and hold office at the pleasure of the Council, which body will also set the salary of the Clerk in accordance with budget appropriations.

Shall the Village of Beverly Hills, County of Oakland, Michigan, borrow the sum of not exceeding \$116,000.00 and issue its General Obligation Bonds therefore for the purpose of widening Greenfield Road and Southfield Road from its present width of 48 feet to 60 feet respectively from 13 Mile Road to 14 Mile Road, widening of 14 Mile Road from its existing width to 48 feet from Greenfield Road to Southfield Road and the construction of new 24 foot pavement on 14 Mile Road from Evergreen to the West Village limits, such additions and improvements to include necessary drainage and appurtenances?

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2

Shall the Village of Beverly Hills, County of Oakland, Michigan, borrow the sum of not exceeding \$41,000.00 and issue its General Obligation Bonds therefore for the purpose of construction of new 24 foot pavement on 14 Mile Road from construction of pavement, partially 33 feet and partially 27 feet on Pierce Road from 13 Mile Road to 14 Mile Road, construction of 24 foot pavement on Evergreen Road from 13 to 14 Mile Road, construction of 24 foot pavement on 14 Mile Road from Evergreen to West Village limits and construction of 20 foot pavement on Riverside from River Rouge Bridge to Evergreen Road, such additions and improvements to include necessary drainage and appurtenances?

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3

## PEOPLE'S COLUMN Birmingham AAUW Supports Constitution

To the Editor:

The proposed new state constitution will be ratified or rejected by Michigan voters on April 1.

Believing that the proposed Constitution as a whole is an improvement over the present one, the Michigan division of the American Association of University Women acted last May to seek its passage and urged local branches in the state to study the provisions of the new as compared to the present document so that members could vote intelligently.

A Birmingham branch AAUW legislative committee, under the chairmanship of Mrs. George R. Mosher, has been busy throughout the past year studying the subject.

A report on education, Article VIII, which is of particular interest to AAUW members, was made by Mrs. Frederick W. Pines at the February luncheon of the group. Mrs. Mosher reported on the provisions of the constitution for the executive branch and for the judicial branch in January.

Feeling that the Michigan Constitution would be grossly improved if adopted by the voters, and that any controversial issues could still be changed by amendment in the future, the Birmingham branch voted to support the
