Area Canines Compete In Detroit Dog Show

Several entries from the Birmingham-Blooded breed will compete Sunday in the 45th annual Detroit Kennel Club all-breed dog show at Cobo Hall.

The affair is expected to be the showcase for the display of the finest and most varied company of canine aristocrats ever assembled in one place in Michigan.

THE DKC SHOW this year has 1,551 entries from 92 breeds. This is the biggest entry since 1955, and it is easily the greatest variety of breeds in the long history of the show.

Dogs will be shown in six rings, according to present plans. All the dogs will be in the benching area throughout the day, except when they are in action in the ring. The show will open at 9 a.m. and end with the climactic selection of the best in show about 9:30 p.m.

A feature of exceptional interest will be the obedience trials, competitive events in which well-trained dogs show amazing ability to respond to spoken or hand signals. These events are always fascinating, even for the casual observer.

COBO HALL has abundant parking facilities inside the building. Accommodations for the comfort of spectators will be the best ever offered at a Michigan dog show. The Detroit Kennel Club is a non-profit organization.

The most popular breeds in the show will be the collies, German shepherds, English bulldogs, spaniels, Irish setters, Doberman pinschers, miniature poodles, Weimaraners, Brittany spaniels and pointers.

But the show will also offer such rare and interesting breeds as the Afghan, the Borzoi, the Akita, the Komondor, the Kuwazaki, the Viszla, the Bouvier des Flandres, the Keeshond and the Papillon.

The following specialty club will consider the displays for their breed at their specialty show: German Shorthaired Pointer Club of Michigan, Michigan German Setter Club, Michigan Brittany Club, English Springer Spaniel Club of Michigan, Weimaraner Club of America, Basset Hound Club of Greater Detroit, Midwest Cattle Club, Miniature Schnauzer Club of Michigan, Scottish Terrier Club of Michigan, Pommeranian Club of Michigan and the Detroit Bulldog Club.

Seaholm Initiates University Exchange Teaching Program

Colleen Labbe, Seaholm High School English teacher, and Dr. William Schwab of Oakland University (formerly MSU) have engaged in an exchange teaching program which makes a pioneer cooperative effort in this respect.

Under the exchange program arranged by the two schools, Dr. Schwab is teaching the linguistics approach to grammar in one of Miss Labbe's classes at Seaholm the morning, while Miss Labbe is teaching Dr. Schwab's 11 a.m. class in American literature at Oakland University four days a week.

This is Seaholm's first experience in a university exchange teaching program. The purpose is to develop better understanding of secondary and university teaching. During the period of the exchange, Dr. Schwab will spend some time consulting with the linguistics approach in teaching grammar to high school students.

Arrangements for the exchange were made by Dr. Darwood Varner, chancellor and Dr. George T. Matthews, associate dean of humanities representing Oakland. Mrs. Katherine Blunt, English department chairman, and Ross A. Wagner, principal represented Seaholm.
