The women will carry with them an inscribed and framed "Resolution." It will state that the school will stand 100 per cent strong in support of the new Constitution.

The day will also consist of luncheon at the Lansing YWCA with Mrs. Romney as guest speaker, a visit to the legislature in session and a tour of the Capitol.

residents who felt there should be a group to represent them.

At least they would have some voice, somebody to speak for them, he insisted.

Renfrew then said he would be in favor of an open meeting at which any resident could speak on the subject. But, he added:

"I would hate to assume that you or anyone could devise a committee to better represent the residents of this city than their elected officials."

JOHN GANNON, president of the Populist Subdivision Association, said he hoped the commission might extend an invitation to residents at-large to participate in discussion and planning for the CBDD.

"Why not schedule a meeting at the Community House (where 600 persons could be seated) and throw it open to give everyone a chance to speak and ask questions?"

Ingram and Commissioner Carl F. Renfrew felt that individual residents or a property owners who do not have a business interest could "come and learn something" about the plan.

ROBERTS cautioned that this was a "far too important subject to dramatize at this point" and to not "make it a political football."

Renfrew proposed that the commission pen a letter to Robert A. Thon, chairman of the Citizens Action Committee, which has advocated the inclusion of aesthetic values in any development program.

Thom would be asked to report on his committee's program for a broader community project than just the central business area.

Commissioners agreed to write the letter.

WILLIAM REDDING, 688 Chester, who lives in Brock's neighborhood, said he was "a little bit concerned" about relying on people like Thon who are not Birmingham residents. Thom lives in Bloomfield Township.

Redding emphasized, however, that he felt Thom "did an excellent job" of presenting the CAC's views at the Feb. 14 community meeting.

Would people like Thom who are not local residents be the "ideal" persons to be responsible for such actions, Redding asked.

MAYOR WILLETT quickly pointed out that Thom is president of the Community House Board of Directors and called him a "dedicated man."

**Judge Barnard Discusses Plans For Child Care**

Probate Judge Norman R. Barnard of Oakland County discussed plans for the proposed Children's Village in a talk Monday evening before the James Connant P.T.O. in Bloomfield Township. He was introduced by R. L. Waldron, program chairman.

In a review of the work of the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court, Judge Barnard explained the general philosophy that each child coming before the court receive such care, guidance and control, as will serve the best interests and welfare of the child.

HE ALSO explained the program of the court for early detection and prevention of delinquency and the need to reach and help families while the children are young.

A film showing the facilities provided for children by the county in the children's Center and Youth Home was shown.
