

## Pastor Illustrates Sermons

During the special Wednesday evening Lenten service at Redeemer Lutheran Church this year, the Rev. Duane Wuggeizer has been illustrating his series of Lenten sermons on the "Symbols of His Suffering."

This has been done by displaying on a large poster before the entire congregation the symbol under discussion for the evening.

According to Pastor Wuggeizer, "the first of these symbols was a large chalice symbolizing the Savior's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane and the cup of suffering which Jesus asked the Heavenly Father to take from Him."

"Because Jesus drank of this cup of suffering, He now offers to His followers the cup of blessing. The 'why' of human suffering was answered through this sermon."

Wednesday evening the illustrated symbol was the "Sword and Severe Ear."

In this message, said Pastor Wuggeizer, he weighed the value of "love" and "law" in promoting the Kingdom of God.

"You might force a person to go to church but you cannot compel him to believe in Jesus Christ as his Savior," he said.

This is something which only can be accomplished as the individual experiences the love of God in his life."

Subsequent messages will present "The Purple and the Silver," "The Sponges and the Reed," "The Hammer and the Nails" and "The Ever and the Basin."

St. Stephen's Episcopal Church will experience a weekend at Parishfield as it continues its extensive Lenten program.

People from all walks of life from various branches of the Christian Church and from many sections of the country convene at Parishfield.

St. Stephen's has reserved Parishfield facilities for this weekend, Friday through Sunday. The Rev. Carl R. Sayers, rector of St. Stephen's, will accompany the group and participate with the staff in the leadership of its activities.

The weekend program will follow the parish's Lenten theme for this year, "The Christian Style of Life."

# Non-Resident Students Contribute to Economy

Some \$10,000 rolls into Michigan for every student from another state who attends Michigan State University for four years, according to a study by that institution.

A slight variation between the tuition fees at MSU, the University of Michigan and Wayne State University, the "Big Three" of state-supported institutions of higher learning, would indicate this could be an average contribution to Michigan's economy.

Multiply this by the number of non-resident students at the three universities and the contribution to the state is considerable.

Tuition at MSU is \$870 per year, for the nine-month school year, to non-residents. During the most recent complete school term MSU recorded 5,421 out-of-state students at East Lansing and another 77 at its Oakland branch.

The University of Michigan charges out-of-state students \$900 during the first two years and \$950 during the last two years and \$950 for the upper-class years. The Ann Arbor institution leads the state colleges in non-resident enrollments with 7,748 out-of-state students registered last fall.

At Wayne, some 771 non-residents pay \$666 per year for their education.

With the exception of one or two universities, MSU and U. of M. charge the highest non-resident rates in the nation.
