

## School Budget Submitted to 29 Trustees

A record Oakland County Schools operating budget of \$600,385 was expected to be approved at the Feb. 28 meeting in the County Service Center of a committee of 29 local school board members.

The Oakland County School Board had already approved the budget which needed only the approval of the local trustees before being submitted to the County Tax Allocation Board.

The new budget is more than double last year's of approximately \$247,000. Increases include some \$50,000 for annual salary raises, a new reading clinic and research.

A new law making county school boards financially independent requires the action by local school trustees.

## MSU Herbarium Receives Name

The 90-year-old herbarium at Michigan State University has received official designation.

The university's collection of 129,211 specimens of vascular (higher) plants now form the Beal-Darlington Herbarium, named for the late Dr. William J. Beal, who started the collection, and Dr. Henry T. Darlington, who retired from MSU in 1945 after 31 years on the faculty. The collection of 61,502 specimens of algae, lichen and other lower, non-flowering plants will be called the Cryptogamic Herbarium.

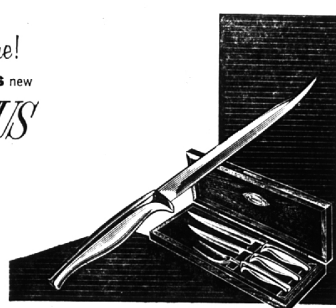
