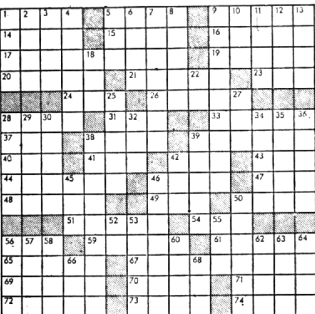

Young Pianist Gives Concert Before Guild

Lee Luvisi, 25-year-old American pianist, currently on his third North American concert tour, will be presented by the Cranbrook Music Guild at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday in Cranbrook House.

Upon graduation from the Curtis Institute of Music at an early age, Luvisi was appointed a member of the Institute faculty, the youngest in its history. He still holds the faculty position and is still the youngest member.

Since making his Carnegie Hall debut in 1957, he has rapidly consolidated his position as a leading young artist. He has appeared with numerous orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic and the Philadelphia Orchestra.

LUVISI has entered only one major competition, the Queen Elisabeth of Brussels Concours, where he won a \$1500 prize and a return invitation for a debut tour of Europe which included eight orchestral engagements on the continent.

Last season, Lee Luvisi appeared in Chicago, Philadelphia and Montreal in addition to playing dozens of recitals and orchestral dates across the country and starring on television's Recital Hall.

Winstons Lend Art For Institute Show

In conjunction with the exhibit of contemporary Dutch art which opens tomorrow at the Detroit Institute of Arts, 18 pieces from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Winston Sr. of Birmingham will be shown.
