

State Welfare League Holds Legislative Forum

Current and pending legislation relating to health and welfare, including the much discussed A.D.C. bill, will be reviewed at the second annual "Legislative Forum" of the Michigan Welfare League March 17, at Michigan State University.

Gov. George W. Romney and Rev. Benjamin L. Masse, editor of "America" magazine, head the list of speakers, tackling such social issues as crime and delinquency, health, welfare, mental health and human relations.

Expected at NSU's Union Building are nearly 200 members of the League and other key Michigan citizens interested in health and welfare problems at the state and local level. More than 50 statewide organizations will be sending delegates including: Michigan Association of County Welfare Boards, Michigan State Council on Crime and Delinquency, Local Community Councils and Chastis, League of Women Voters, Michigan State Chambers of Commerce, Michigan AFL-CIO, and American Association of University of Women.

PURPOSE OF THE day-long meeting is to acquaint these citizens with current, pending, proposed and needed state and federal health and welfare legislation, and to familiarize them with the way in which the legislative process works.

Gov. Romney will address the noon general session on the general topic of social services for Michigan. Rev. Masse opens the morning general session with a discussion of the role and implications of government services in health and social welfare.

Heading five morning workshop sessions are some of Michigan's leading authorities in the area of health and social welfare.

John B. Martin of Grand Rapids, chairman of the Michigan Crime and Delinquency Council, will lead a workshop on crime and delinquency. Speaking will be Wayne County Circuit Judge Nathan J. Kaufman of Detroit on "The Adult Offender and the Model Sentencing Act" and Calhoun County Judge

Dr. McKinney Leads Series For Parents

Dr. D. L. McKinney's Institute for Parents will begin at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Greenfield School, Southfield, library and will continue for 10 sessions on succeeding Tuesday evenings.

The meetings will be conducted in round table form and will last for approximately two hours.

The first hour will be devoted to a lecture or a film followed by an hour of discussion.

During this period the parents may present areas of personal concern. Dr. McKinney will guide parents in the solution of these problems.

DR. MCKINNEY has served as the principal of the Youth Home School, which is connected with the Juvenile Court of Detroit, for many years.

He has taught advanced courses at Wayne State University for the past seven years, instructing teachers in child psychology.

Dr. McKinney also serves as consultant to President Kennedy's Conference of Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime.

A family registration plan, allowing either parent to attend the lecture, is in effect for the series.

Citizens' Group Studies Maps on School Growth

The West Bloomfield Schools Citizens' Advisory Committee met Wednesday at the Roosevelt School, Keweenaw Harbor. Early arrivals toured the building under the guidance of Mrs. Gertrude Ealy, school principal.

Don Somers, committee trustee, presented a population growth report. Using detailed maps of West Bloomfield, shaded according to zoning classifications, the survey indicated that eventually approximately 1,000 to 1,200 school children will reside in a five to six-square mile area in the south end of the school district. This area comprises the portions of Sections Nos. 26, 27, 28, 33, 34, and 35 lying within the West Bloomfield School District.

THE COMMITTEE studying the effect of parochial and private school developments on the area school population, reported that the number of children attending non-public schools was average for the section but would increase as the housing developments were completed.

Mrs. Nerec Alix, chairman, assisted by Mrs. Filip Simpson, Mrs. Martin Kabeber, and Mrs. Martin Kabeber, will continue to study this phase of the school population growth.

A report on the administrative structures for schools was prepared by Nelson O'Shaughnessy. This information covered the types of grade organization plans common in Michigan school districts.

Assisting O'Shaughnessy with the survey was John Zurbrugg, Mrs. Kenneth Hahnfeldt, Mrs. Hugh MacCluff, and Mrs. Richard Groat.

LAND AREA of typical school sites in nearby school districts was described by Dr. Leif Hougen, superintendent, West Bloomfield School District. Acreage considered adequate for elementary, junior high and senior high school plants located in Walled Lake, Farmington, Bloomfield, Bloomfield Hills and Waterford were surveyed and studied by the group.

At the close of the meeting, the membership present was asked to individually assay the progress of the group thus far and indicate suggestions for continued study of the school site problems.

Tax Return Must Include All Dividends

The Internal Revenue Service has issued a reminder to all taxpayers that all interest and dividends, whether paid directly to you or credited to your account, must be included in your income tax return.

R. L. Nixon, district director of Internal Revenue, stated that the 1962 Form 1040 has been changed providing separate lines for reporting both dividends and interest.

The director further stated that there are certain exclusions and credits which will reduce the tax liability on dividends. It was added that taxpayers should check the instruction booklet and follow carefully the schedule on the return to make sure that the benefits are claimed correctly.

Director Nixon stressed that before signing and filing your return, you should make sure that all income is properly reported and all allowable deductions are claimed.
