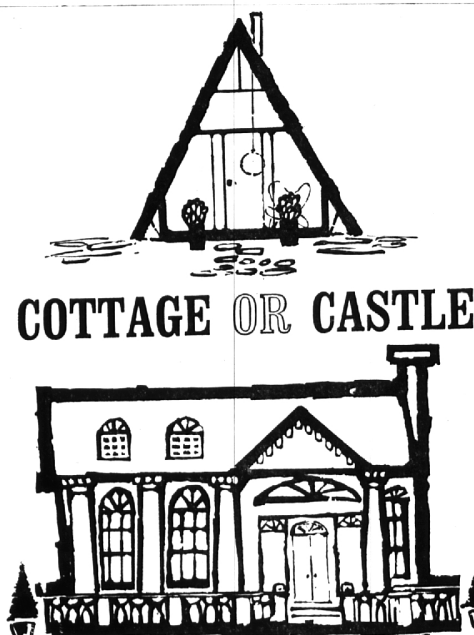
The class and the choir members also attended the Metropolitan Opera's presentation of "The Barber of Seville" at Groves High School on March 15.

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
