The Michigan State University Concert Band will present a concert at the Wylie E. Groves High School auditorium, Evergreen at Thirteen Mile Road, Thursday, March 21, at 8 p.m.

The 100 piece band will be under the baton of Prof. Leonard V. Falcone, director since 1927. Falcone, who enjoys a national reputation as director, guest conductor and soloist, announces a balanced repertoire of old and new, grand and light opera, sacred and secular works, fast-stepping marches and traditional melodies.

The concert is part of the annual "Cap and Gown" series offered each winter and spring by the MSU Continuing Education Service.

Sponsored locally by the Birmingham Groves High School Music Parents' Club, the concert is open to the public. The presentation is expected to serve a dual purpose: First, to provide example and inspiration for the school-aged music students of the area, and secondly, through the proceeds from the ticket sale, to provide music scholarships.

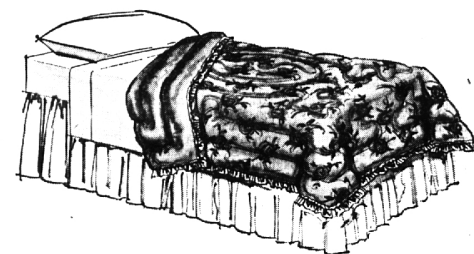

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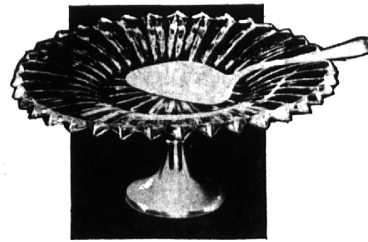
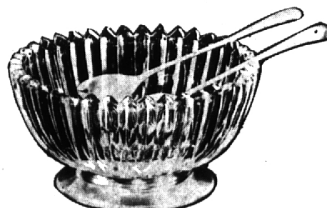
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
