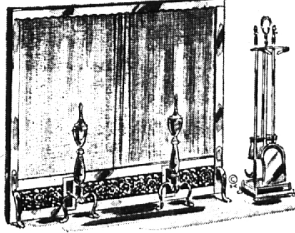

TWO WILDLIFE figures of Michigan's past—the moose and lynx—are staring a comeback in the Upper Peninsula, according to the conservation department. Forced out of the state's picture following the early logging days, both species have shown signs that their numbers are building up slowly, but surely, above the Straits.

Lynx, Moose Increase In Upper Peninsula

The day may not be far off when a once-lost member of Michigan's wildlife family—the Canada lynx—will regain its place as an established resident of the upper peninsula's densely-forested areas. That's the way things look to William Laycock, of Marquette, the conservation department's regional game supervisor.

He reports that 10 lynx were killed above the Straits last year, the most recorded since the animal dropped out of the state's picture—or nearly was—as a result of Michigan's virgin forests being cut over.

THERE IS a good chance that more lynx were taken in 1962 than reported, because they can easily be mistaken for the little brother, the bobcat. In other words, some lynx kills may have passed for bobcats.

In this, in turn, points to the possibility that the upper peninsula's lynx population may be even higher than kill reports have indicated in recent years. Department game men in the field have noted signs which suggest that lynx numbers are building up slowly.

Michigan Week Awards Deadline Set for Entries

Michigan industry, agriculture and civic organizations have less than three weeks to enter the annual Michigan Week awards competition, according to Milton Kendrick, state awards chairman.

Kendrick, of Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., Detroit, said the number of this year's entries is far ahead of last year, "but we know there are hundreds of qualified applicants who are missing a wonderful opportunity to call national attention to their products and achievements by failing to enter this competition."

KENDRICK POINTED out that in addition to awards for the top industrial "Product of the Year" and community achievement, a new award will be made this year to an agricultural product or process. All three categories must be judged at the county level by March 25. Outstanding products will be displayed in Detroit during Michigan Week, May 19 to 25.

Area Citizens To Help Judge Ford Awards

Two local citizens will assist four other judges to select Ford Motor Co. employees to receive special recognition in the company's fourth annual greater Detroit-area community service awards program. The judges will meet next week to review community accomplishments of Ford men and women nominated for 1963 awards.

Judges include Mrs. Worth Kramer, a director of Detroit's United Foundation, and Richard Van Dusen, legal advisor to Gov. George Romney. Others are Dr. Samuel L. Brownell, James M. Hare, Rabbi Richard C. Hertz and Joseph L. Hudson, Jr.

"Citizen-of-the-Year" awards will go to Ford employees whose service to their communities is singled out by the committee as exceptional. The award is a cast bronze bell engraved with the employee's name and the symbolic figure of the town crier. Other employees will receive mounted scrolls with engraved commendations from Henry Ford II, company board chairman.

Awards will be presented at a banquet March 26.
