U. of D. Fund Goes Beyond Halfway Mark
The University of Detroit \$100,000 Challenge Fund has passed the halfway mark.

Since December, 1961, nearly 1,400 donors have pledged \$266,333 towards the target of five buildings, faculty salaries and student aid.

Plans for the construction of two buildings included in the goal of the Challenge Fund were announced recently by the Rev. Laurence V. Britt, S.J., president.

"Construction of both the Biology Research Building and the Administrative Center are now in the immediate planning stage," Father Britt said. "It is expected that ground will be broken for both buildings during this calendar year."

A GIFT OF \$500,000 from the Ford Motor Co. Fund plus one of \$300,000 from the Kresge Foundation—both designed for the Biology Research Building—place this building at the top of the construction list.

Board Discusses Garaging Costs, Beach Facilities

An expression of regret at the death of former school board member Frank Arnoldi was made by Bloomfield Hills School Board at its meeting recently. Members expressed gratitude for his years of service both on the board and off.

Additional topics discussed included costs of a service garage for school buses, beach facilities for summer recreation, and transportation for handicapped children living in the school district but attending special schools in other districts.

COST FIGURES OF \$104,000 to provide a service garage and special parking for school buses led to a motion to investigate the possibility of leasing school bus transportation for the school district.

Development of school owned property on Walnut Lake for summer recreation swimming was estimated at \$2,500. The board authorized expenditure of \$400 for lake borings necessary for engineering the project.

No formal action was taken on providing transportation for handicapped children. Purchase of two small buses at \$2,000 each will be necessary. Operating costs will amount to \$8,799.

Birmingham Kiwanis Tells of Members Serving in Congress
