

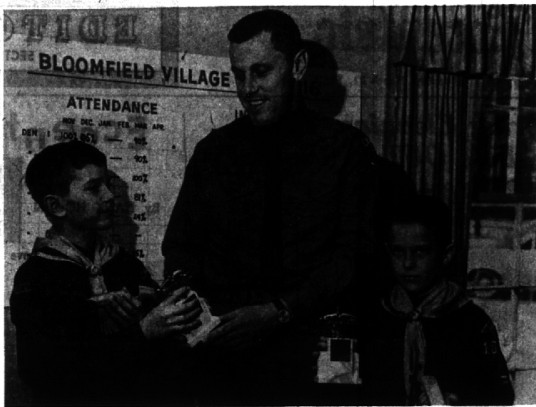

Pinewood Derby Time

One of the highlights of Cub Scout activities in the Birmingham area is the running of the Pinewood Derby. Two were held recently and they were met with enthusiasm not only by the participants but also by a large throng of spectators. First, second and third place trophies were won by Loch MacAdam, Tim Wangler and Dave Penniman. Each year the Cub Scouts purchase identical blocks of wood and four wheels and then design their own cars. Usually the racers are whittled, sanded and painted during the weekly den meetings. The gravity-powered cars are rolled down a 52-foot ramp—two or three at a time. The judging is based on double elimination.

MSU Band Performs At Groves Tonight

Tonight at 8 the Michigan State University Concert Band, called one of the best in the country, will perform in the Groves Auditorium. The 100-piece band received national fame through its trips to the Rose Bowl and the Rose Parade in 1954 and 1956. They have played in Washington for two presidents and were recognized by late great bandmaster Edwin Goldman as one of the two or three finest in the country.
