

Seaholm Singers Will Compete in Vocal Festival

The Michigan State District 11 Vocal Festival will be presented at 9 a.m., Friday, March 22 at Ferndale High School. Seaholm's mixed choir and girls' glee club will compete with about 20 other schools including the Groves' choir.

Four judges, who are music men from various universities, will judge the choir, ranking them from 1 to 5, with 1 being a superior grade.

Seaholm's mixed choir will sing "They So Softly Rest," by William, and "Alleluia," from the Brazilian Psalm by J. Berger. They will be accompanied by Russ Foster on bass and Rachel Weaver on piano.

Sight read, blending of voices and dynamics will be some of the points on which the judges will be judging the high school choirs.

RECONSIDERATION was given to the Boys' State issue at the March 7 session of Seaholm's House of Representatives when it was found that the needed number of girl applicants for Girls' State had been reached and no more sponsors were required.

At a previous meeting the House had decided not to send a boy, but to sponsor only a girl as has been done in former years. A new motion to send a boy to this government training session was made and passed.

Committee reports included the Senate which revealed the name of the March 29 dance. It will be "Capital Caper," a girl-ask-boy affair. The employment committee stated that a kick-off tea on March

22 will be held to promote the purpose of the co-operative employment program. It was noted that Seaholm has the largest percentage of student participants.

FIELD DAY was then brought up and debated. Suggestions for a solution to ease the tension, create a better point system and to cut down its importance were discussed on the floor. Many felt that judges should have a better knowledge of the actual activities that went on in each class in preparation.

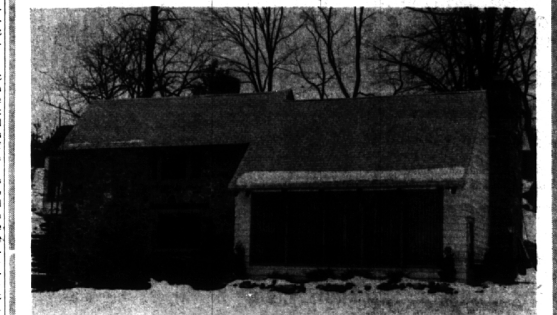
After arguing the pros and cons of Field Day, it was decided to turn the matter over to the Field Day steering committee. With equal representation from the three classes, suggestions will be made to Congress for later consideration.

Last minute preparations are underway for what BUNA (Birmingham United Nations Association) members hope will be the best General Assembly ever seen at Seaholm. This time of year is perhaps the busiest for the organizations "blue heads," those delegation members whose countries are leaders of the East, West, and neutral blocs.

Ben Root, president, will preside over the assembly from the podium, and will have the task of keeping the enthusiastic delegates under control at the one-and-a-half day session beginning March 21. Patti Wyatt is the secretary of the club and Chuck Holtz is the treasurer.
