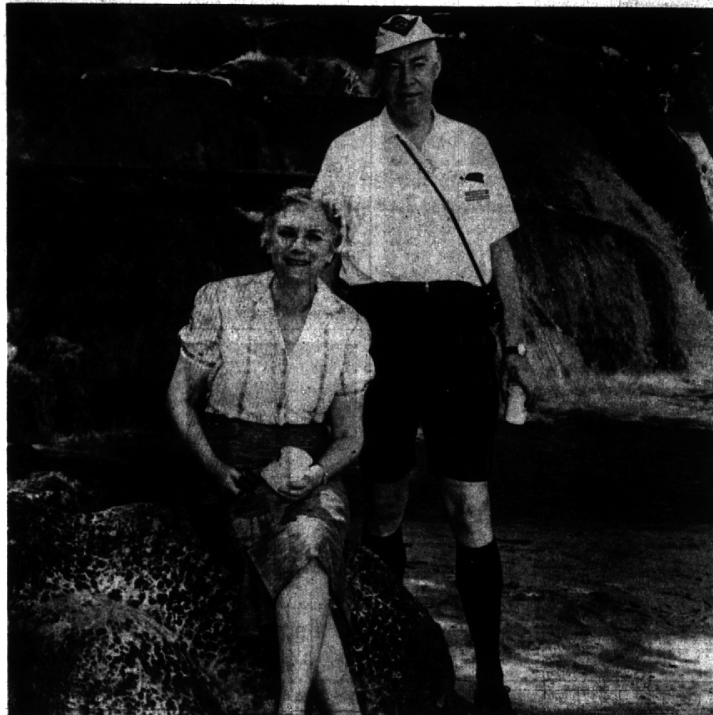

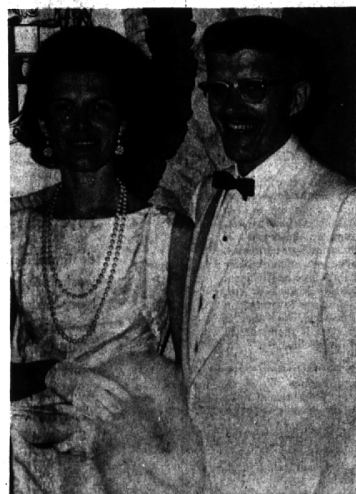
Lynne Nolte to Be Bride
