Old Autos Paraded for Constitution

Led by a 1918 American LaFrance fire engine, a motocrade of more than 50 antique, classic, sports and new 1963 cars tooted through downtown Birmingham at noon Saturday.

Staged by the Committee for the New Constitution to remind citizens of the 1908 vintage of Michigan's present constitution, the motocrade started from the village green in Franklin.

There village fathers served coffee and doughnuts to arriving paraders and the 30-piece Franklin Band played old-time music. In charge of the Franklin reception arrangements was Councilman Robert Winkel, assisted by Mrs. Elsie Garwood, Dr. John Burger and Donald P. Elze.

JUDGES AWARDED A \$10 third prize to two young Birmingham residents, eight-year-old Lois Bryant and four-year-old Kim Spann, for their old-fashioned "Sunday best" outfits. Top award of \$100 for the best antique car participating went to William A. Means of Orchard Lake, owner of a shining 1909 Buick.

Over 75 cars lined up at the start. Some ran out of gas after a tour of Keego Harbor and the Pontiac Mall. The motocrade covered over 60 miles, winding up at Northland Inn. Among the active participants were League of Women Voters members Mrs. Brooks Marshall and Mrs. John H. Bryant; Mrs. John R. Vandenberg of the United Church Women; Mrs. Edwin Deer, Oakland Citizens League director; and Mrs. Fritz Pines, of the American Association of University Women.

EACH OF THE organizations, plus Birmingham Jaycees, Birmingham Chamber of Commerce and Oakland County Farm Bureau, is a member of the parade-sponsoring CNC.

Honorary parade marshalls were George Wellington Smith of Franklin; state LNW President Mrs. Thomas Seasham of Birmingham and Henry Scripps Booth, chairman of CNC.

hope is that an area-wide library system would be developed with Troy, Franklin and West Bloomfield joining the family.

Many township residents, because of its convenience, will continue to patronize the Birmingham "sister" library, so the township will have to pay the Birmingham library for use of its facilities... a figure yet undetermined.

Township residents at present pay Baldwin \$10,000 in fees for use of the library, although Baldwin has figured that the actual use cost, based on percentages, is nearer \$31,000.

NO MATTER how the \$138,000 is used budgetwise, the individual additional tax a township family will have to pay to have a library at its disposal is easily figured. If a home has a market value of \$38,000 (which is the township mean), its tax bill for the library will be \$16.10, which is slightly more than 50 cents per \$1,000 of market value.

The township residents' vote on Monday will determine whether they think the price is right!

and every time there is a change in a water account, a brochure is also sent.

THE ONLY other way the regulations can be checked, Brien said, is by residents contacting the DPW. He said the contractor does not have personal contact with the people.

If the DPW were to put an inspector on the routes it would increase rubbish collection costs about \$6,000 a year, Brien said. Currently, the rubbish collection payment the township is about \$939 per week for 1,876 single family units. This averages out to 12.3 cents per home per week.

OTHER COMPLAINTS have been received, Brien said, concerning damage to cans, littering and half-emptying containers and of employees being disrespectful to residents.

A record of all complaints is kept on file in the DPW office and when an unusual number are received covering a certain phase of the collection the contractor is called in and the problem is discussed.

"Many times the contractor and a DPW representative meet with the home-owner to try to resolve a collection problem," Brien said.

curb radius would be maintained. He said it might be necessary to acquire a small triangular parcel of property to allow for the larger radius.

A longer transition in the Southside pavement from about 100 feet south of Brown to the north of Brown would eliminate the second problem, according to Killen.

"THIS CHANGE would allow a much smoother flow for both north and southbound Southside traffic," Killen said.

He added that there would be no physical change required on the west side of Southside, although a portion of the pavement would not be used for normal traffic flow.

The change on the east side of Southside south of Brown also calls for a 25-foot radius at the southeast corner of the intersection. The existing curb has a 12-foot radius, which, according to the engineering department, is insufficient.

Killen said he had discussed the proposed changes with Police Chief Ralph W. Mosley and he felt they would be decided improvements for the intersection.

City Fathers Accused Of Slighting VTC

To the Editor:

It was not surprising to learn once again the official attitude of the Birmingham City Commission relative to opposing Detroit's Income Tax on nonresidents. It is with deep regret that our committee does not have the full cooperation of the city fathers in this vital matter that affects so many Birmingham residents who are paying the lion's share of this income tax.

Many citizens have called me regarding this situation and are very disturbed, to say the least, because Birmingham is not doing more (we have obtained 1,600 signatures out of a potential of 12,000 voters).

SINCE WE HAVE obtained official clearance from the state's election director, Robert Montgomery, as to collecting signatures at the polls, we plan to be there on April 1 to give the citizens of Birmingham an opportunity to express themselves.

We feel we have every right to petition in any public street or building; this right is guaranteed by both the U.S. and Michigan constitutions and we challenge the Birmingham commission to deny us this right.

We are interested in two things—seeking volunteers to man the polls and obtain signatures by giving citizens the opportunity to express themselves on this most vital matter of taxation.

I NOTE FOR THE record that Detroit is currently studying a proposed budget increase in city taxes.
