

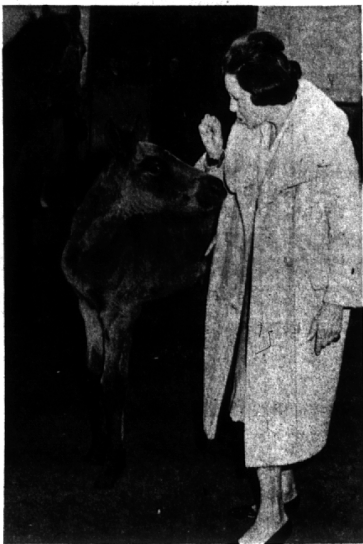

First tentative steps were taken on a blustery day last week toward making this year's annual Horse Show and Hunt Fair, June 25-30, one of the most dramatic and exciting events of the summer season.

Committee members plowed through slush and wind to sit around a table at Bloomfield Open Hunt—traditional locale of the show—to talk about daisies, lemonade and water proof tents!

Afterwards, they refreshed memories by taking a tour of the grounds and stables (where the above pictures were taken), mentally blueprinting locations of show rings, concessions and midway.

ACCORDING TO Mrs. Al Girard of Bloomfield Hills—co-chairman with Mrs. L. L. Colbert also of Bloomfield—hundreds of daisies will give welcoming nods

to visitors at the fair this year, a theme evolving from practical-minded Daisy Colbert last year. With an eye to the convenience of riders as well as spectators, she set up a temporary lemonade stand on a card table under the trees and single-handedly sold more lemonade at her "stand" than was sold at the established tent. This year the committee decided to erect a tent on the same spot and, obviously, it
