The finals of the knock-out team of four event have been decided and the George Alderton II team won the trip to the Nationals. This team included two members from the Birmingham area, Edwin V. Clarke and George Clarke.

The runner-up position has not yet been decided and there are still four teams in the running. Although this match included teams from Port Huron to Detroit and Pontiac to Mc. Clemens, there are players in all four remaining teams from Birmingham.

In the recent master-point game at the Birmingham YMCA, Bill Cooper of Birmingham achieved a top board on today's hand.

Both sides vulnerable. Dealer: South.

The bidding:

Opening lead: J ♠
Betty's bid of one no trump was well thought out.

Should she have opened with a heart and her partner responded with one spade, her only rebid would have been two hearts and that would not have been adequate. Bill's bid of two diamonds was the correct response demanding that the auction continue to game.

When Bill found that his partner could not raise in spades, he jumped to game as he knew there

was no slam in the hand and that spades must be the best contract.

BILL WON the opening lead with his singleton king of clubs and led a small spade to dummy.

East won this trick and saw a chance to defeat the hand by taking two spade tricks and either two diamonds or one club and one diamond, so he returned a small spade which was won in dummy.

When Bill saw that West showed out of spades he now saw a plan to force East to trump in which he could over-trump to stop the second loser in trump.

HE RETURNED to his hand with the king of hearts, led a small heart and successfully hooked the jack. He knew that if he returned the ace of hearts, East would

trump and he would be held to five—but he had other plans.

He now played the ace of clubs, dropped the remaining heart from his hand, then played the ace of hearts.

When East trumped, he over-trumped, pulled the remaining trump from East's hand with his king, returned to the board with the ace of diamonds and dropped his two losing diamonds on the good hearts for six spades.



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
