### Chrysler Designers Display Art Work

More than 40 stylists, clay modelers, designers and draftsmen from Chrysler Corp.'s style staff displayed their spare-time non-automotive paintings, sculptures and free art forms last weekend at the company's styling studio.

The display was judged by Marshall Fredericks, Birmingham sculptor, Zolton Sepecky, president of the Cranbrook Art Academy, and Sarkis Sarkisian, director of the Society of Arts and Crafts. The three judges selected displays which will be shown to the public in a special two-week showing at the J. L. Hudson Art Gallery in Hudson's downtown store, April 8 to 22.

Buffet include a selection from the portfolio "Scenes of Paris." Titles of the oil paintings are "Self Portrait" and "Portrait of Annabel."

Hours for the exhibition in the Jacobson Home Decorative shops are from 9:30 to 5:30 p.m. daily, and until 9 p.m. on Thursdays.

Buffet's annual shows in Paris have been described as "almost like a Hollywood preview." Extra police often have to be called out to handle the autograph seekers.

He has been called the darling of the European-international set, which pays such fantastic prices for his artistry that Buffet owns two Rolls Royces and a chateau in the country.

BUFFET HAS designed the decors for two ballets, including Françoise Sagan's 1958 work, "Bend Sinister."

He studied at L'Ecole de Beaux Arts, Paris, and had his first one-man show in 1947. The following year he was awarded the Prix de la Critique.

Ten years later, the Gallery Charpentier in Paris staged a retrospective show called "Cent Tableaux," showing 100 of the paintings which had brought Buffet such outstanding success since the end of World War II.

His work hangs in the Museum of Modern Art, and Petit Palais, both in Paris, plus many foreign museums and private collections.

RUSSIAN-BORN Chagall was the subject of a recent Saturday Evening Post feature. It described record-breaking New York crowds which flocked to a 1961 showing of 12 stained glass windows by Chagall.

Chagall came to the United States in 1941 at the invitation of the Museum of Modern Art, New York. He lived here until 1948, when he returned to his home in France.

In recent years, retrospective exhibitions of the 78-year-old artist's work have been held in New York, Chicago, Paris, London and Amsterdam.

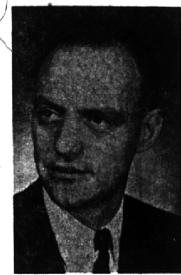
