

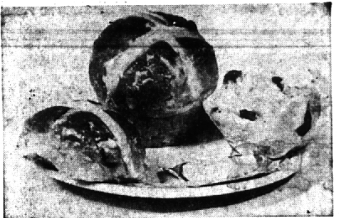
Obituary Notices

William V. Scrimger, 24, of Dearborn, and Dennis J. Covault, 16, of Pontiac, drivers of two of the cars, were treated at the same hospital and discharged as Mrs. Carol Scrimger, 25.

POLICE SAID Covault's car, northbound on Woodward, and Scrimger's car collided at 1:41 p.m. Scrimger was eastbound on Square Lake Road. Witnesses said Covault made a left turn through a red light, hitting Scrimger's car, according to police.

The driver of the third car involved in the accident, Sophie Bernman, 57, of Detroit was not hurt. McManus was a passenger in Covault's car, police said.

Bloomfield Village Principal Resigns After 20 Years

Marsden B. Wilson, principal of Bloomfield Village's Elementary School, has announced his resignation, effective at the close of the school year. Wilson has served as Bloomfield Village principal since he joined the Birmingham Public Schools in 1948.

A native of Dryden, Mich., Wilson attended Eastern Michigan University where he received his life certificate in 1926 and his BA degree in 1941. In 1947, he received his masters degree from Wayne State University.

He began his teaching career in 1926 where he taught and was principal of the high school in Barrington, Mich. Three years later, he became principal of high school in Attica, Mich., and five years later joined the Washington, Mich., schools in 1941.

In 1942, he became an elementary principal in the Macomb County public schools, before coming to Bloomfield in 1948.

WILSON, WHO IS a member of Phi Delta Kappa, honorary education fraternity, is a past chairman of region 7 (Oakland County) Department of Elementary School Principals.

He was chairman of the audio-visual committee of the Birmingham Public Schools for a number of years and he is presently serving as a member of the advisory board of audio-visual education.
