### Writer Assails MD's On Fluoridation Stand

To the Editor:

The time has come to force the hand of every doctor and dentist who is endorsing compulsory fluoridation for entire populations.

There is a certain amount of risk inherent in any medication, whether preventive or therapeutic. Fluoride preparations are no exception. It is argued by proponents of fluoridation that chlorination does not agree with some, and that fluoridation is a better alternative. However, it is the only known method of preventing the spread of water-borne contagious disease, which jeopardizes the safety of every individual in a community and chlorine does evaporate from water upon standing or boiling.

Fluorides are not added to water for the purpose of purification. Cavities are neither water-borne nor contagious. There are several safe ways of giving fluorides to those who want them.

**FLUORIDES ARE** known to be cumulative poisons. They are stored in the soft tissues (aorta, kidneys, skin, bladder, liver) as well as the bones and teeth. They do not evaporate, but become more concentrated upon boiling.

If your physician or dentist is advocating compulsory fluoridation for every man, woman and child in your community, this recommendation should be based on his certain guarantee that this plan will be 100% harmless for every person who will be obliged to subscribe to it (short of purchasing bottled water).

If he is absolutely sure, he should be willing, upon request, to give you his personal written statement guaranteeing you and yours against mottled teeth, loss of health, fluoride poisoning, etc. If he will not assume this responsibility, he is acknowledging that he cannot guarantee the complete safety of any medication. As such, he is justified only in recommending treatment to a person.

Lastly, if a person were to suffer ill effect from medication prescribed by his physician, it is not conceivable that he would recommend that his patient continue with that medication, regardless.

You should demand every physician and dentist who is promoting fluoridation to back up his recommendation with a letter of guarantee. If he refuses, his integrity is open to serious question. He has not been honest with you in the stand he has taken.

**30 YEARS AGO**  
April 6, 1933

The organization of a new corporation to replace and succeed the First National Bank of Birmingham, making immediately available from 30 to 60 percent of the deposits of that institution, was proposed yesterday in a formal statement issued and signed by 10 directors and officers of the old bank.

The statement reveals that a previous plan for re-organization of the bank has been found unworkable by the Chief National Bank Examiner.

A board of three canvassers will meet today to certify the results of Monday's record-breaking municipal election in which 2,924 votes were cast by an electorate which chose three new city commissioners, returned four incumbents to office, approved the new city charter by a 6 1/4 to 1 majority, and elected a Municipal Court justice, associate justice and constable.

Birmingham voted, 2 1/2 to 1, Monday in favor of repeal of the 18th Amendment, when it cast 2,053 votes for Preston C. Allen, "wet" delegate to represent the first district at the forthcoming state convention, and only 824 for Ralph I. Corryell, "dry" delegate. The city at the same time remained in Republican ranks by giving majorities to all G.O.P. candidates for state offices.

**15 YEARS AGO**  
April 1, 1948

For the first time since the city commission was created by adoption of the city charter on April 3, 1933, the city commission met and adjourned Monday evening without transacting any city business. Only

three commissioners were present, one less than the required quorum. Mayor Ralph M. Hale and Commissioners Milton F. Mallender and Ray A. Palmer were present.

Birmingham is now headquarters for a battalion of the U. S. Army, according to an announcement made by Col. Bruce G. Booth, commanding officer of the 24th Armored Infantry Battalion, stationed here. The battalion is made up of about 40 Birmingham and Bloomfield reserve officers. The men meet monthly at the Community House for primary drill.

Birmingham's division of "Crusade for Children" will be organized early in April, according to Jack Schaefer, Wayne county chairman of \$1,500,000 drive to aid starving children overseas. Plans for organizing the Metropolitan Detroit area of the campaign, sponsored by American Overseas Aid and United Nations Appeal for Children, were completed early this week by the Executive Committee, Schaefer added.

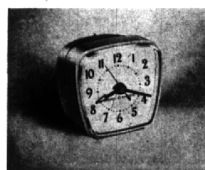

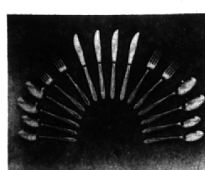

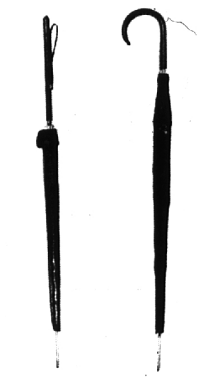
