

## S. L. A. Marshall To Speak to AAUW

"If Not War, Then What?" will be discussed by Gen. S. L. A. Marshall April 10 in the Birmingham Community House. His audience, Birmingham branch of American Association of University Women, will be meeting for a 12:30 p.m. luncheon.

Marshall, a resident of Birmingham and military critic and editorial writer of the Detroit News from 1927-62, served as the youngest officer in the infantry in World War I, and retired as Brigadier General in 1960.

In civilian life he has been a reporter, sports editor, city editor, military analyst, lecturer and TV commentator — with a program Saturday evenings on WWJ-TV.

His military career has spanned many phases, including Chief Historian of European Theater on Staff of the Supreme Commander, Infantry Operations Analyst, and Battlefield Research Specialist in the Central Pacific. He introduced a unique system of "de-briefing" men when they returned from their missions that resulted in standards of pro-

cedure in all theaters of war. He personally covered airborne operations in the Pacific, European, Korean and Middle Eastern theaters.

Marshall is the holder of many medals and decorations, having been honored by the United States, France, Italy, Belgium and Ethiopia. He has been honored by the Friends of the Franklin Library.

THE AUTHOR of 16 books, including "Pork Chop Hill" and "Night Drop," he has assisted in the writing of some 200 others and has a library of some 2300 volumes in his home. He has contributed many articles and reviews for magazines, and has recently taken up painting as a hobby.

Gen. Marshall will be introduced to AAUW by Mrs. Charles J. Shain. Mrs. M. A. Remondino will be in charge of decorating the tables.
