COOMBE SAID that throughout the coming weeks he would "look forward to discussing the nature and extent of those improvements with my fellow citizens."

"The years immediately ahead promise to be both eventful and challenging to the school district," he said.

"However, the spirit of cooperation manifested during the past four years among the district citizens, superintendent, the faculty and staff and the board of education have provided a firm foundation upon which to build."

CANDIDATES for the two board of education seats must file nominating petitions by 4 p.m. May 11 in the office at the Baldwin School.

Voter registration deadline is set for 5 p.m. May 13. All residents of the Birmingham School District are eligible to vote and may register in the municipality in which they live.

Nominating petitions can be picked up at the Baldwin School. The petitions must have 50 to 75 signatures of residents of the school district.

There will be no propositions on the Birmingham ballot this year.

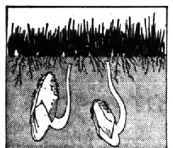

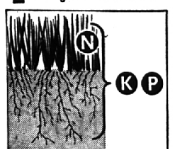

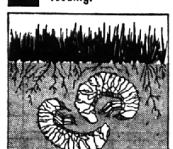
