Dr. Lyle Tiffany, physicist, described the forthcoming satellite exploration of the sun.

Scientists from the Laser Systems Center in Ann Arbor and from the Ford Motor Co. presented a demonstration of one of the Ruby Lasers now in operation. Some 20 students from Groves attended the lectures.

MR. ALBERT A. Johnson, senior research chemist from the M and T Corp. and author of several papers on chromium plating, gave a science lecture April 3 on electroplating.

Mr. Johnson discussed several aspects of physical chemistry and the decorative and industrial purposes of chromium while showing slides on these topics. Also explained was the considerable electroplating used in modern missiles and rockets.

This was the seventh in a series of science lecture series sponsored by the science department at Groves.

The previous discussion was given by Dr. William Hammerle, director of the School of Engineering and Science at Oakland U.
